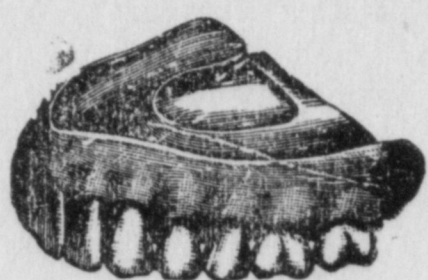

AT WHAT AGE IS MAN STRONGEST.

The muscles, in common with all the organs of the body, have their stages of development and decline; our physical strength increases up to a certain age, and then decreases. Tests of the strength of several thousands of people have been made by means of a dynamometer (strength measurer), and the following are given as the average figures for the white race:—The "lifting power" of a youth of seventeen years is 580lb., in his twentieth year this increases to 620lb., and in the thirtieth and thirty-first year it reaches its height, 656lb. At the end of the thirty-first year the strength begins to decline, very slowly at first. By the fortieth year it has decreased 8lb., and this diminution continues at a slightly increasing rate until the fiftieth year is reached, when the figure is 330lb. After that period of strength falls more and more rapidly until the weakness of old age is reached. It is not possible to give statistics of the decline of strength after the fiftieth year, as it varies to a large extent in different individuals.

MONTREAL FIRE.

MONTREAL, April 6.—A fire which broke out at 10.45 to-night gutted half of the Dominion metal works, Garth & Co., proprietors on Craig street. The firemen were successful in preventing the blaze spreading to the valuable property adjoining. The loss is estimated at \$60,000; well insured. The street railway service in the centre of the city was paralyzed as a result of cut wires, nearly all the lines converging near the location of the fire.

GENERAL NEWS.

Thirty-six locomotives for the Uganda Africa line, are being built in the United States.

Mr. H. Sinard, Mayor of Baie St. Paul, Que., is about starting a woolen factory in that village.

The Italian Press Congress was formally opened at Rome on Wednesday by King Humbert. There were 600 delegates present.

Mr. Wm. Mackenzie is in Winnipeg today. He states that the Dauphin line will be extended this season to the Saskatchewan.

Octave Dutelluel, of Laurier, Ont., has been fined \$100 and sent to gaol to serve one month for having an illicit still in his possession.

The Rhode Island State election on Wednesday resulted in a Republican victory. The Assembly will be Republican by a large majority.

Emperor William is recovering from a severe attack of rheumatism, which for a week has necessitated his remaining part of the time in bed.

The Filipinos have by no means ended their resistance to the Americans. General McArthur has discovered a fresh force of 1,000 natives well armed.

Owing to the serious anti-European agitation throughout China, the foreign Ministers at Peking favour relanding detachments to guard the various legations there.

The Chicago municipal returns settle the question of establishing kindergartens in the public schools. The vote stood 87,972 in favour of kindergartens, 15,878 against.

Mr. Alfred Robitaille, of Quebec, has purchased the mills of J. B. Renaud, and Company, at Beauport, Que., and is about to move his vinegar factory into them.

The Belgian Geographical Society has received a despatch stating that the extreme latitude reached by the Antarctic expeditionary steamer Belgica was 71.36 south; longitude, 92.

Mr. W. A. Marsh, boot and shoe manufacturer, of Quebec, has shipped a full line of his samples to Australia, with a view to opening up a new line of trade with that country.

The City Treasurer of Toronto has received a cheque for \$8,246.15 from the Toronto Railway Company, being the percentage on gross receipts for March, which amounted to \$103,076.88.

Owing to the serious illness of one of the jurymen engaged in trying Nancy Guilford at Bridgeport, Conn., on a charge of murdering Emma Gill, the case has been adjourned until Tuesday next.

Advices from Honolulu state that a secret movement is under way in Hawaii to flood the island with Portuguese labourers from the Azore Islands, as a consequence of the exclusion of Japanese.

Lud K. Cameron, the accountant of the Ontario Legislative Assembly has checked over the accounts of the past session. To the members for mileage and sessional indemnity was given the sum of \$58,136.40.

Financial assistance for the construction of the new steel bridge over the Ottawa river at Portage du Fort was asked from the Dominion Government by a deputation of twenty from that centre Friday morning.
News reached St. John's, Nfld., on Wednesday, of the burning of a French lobster factory on St. John's Island, off the west coast, the largest French fishing centre along the treaty shore of Newfoundland. A lot of valuable fishing tackle and boats were also destroyed.

The Chicago City Council now stands politically as follows: Thirty-four Democrats, thirty-three Republicans, and one Independent Republican. Thirty-eight members stand pledged to methods favored by the reform organization.

The Egyptian Government is considering a scheme for a railway through the eastern Soudan, probably from Khartoum on the Nile to Suakin on the Red Sea, by way of Kassala, in Nubia. The idea would be to secure the Abyssinian traffic.

The United States army signal corps expects to be able to flash messages from the War Department at Washington to Fort Myer, five miles distant by means of electric waves in the manner employed by Signor Marconi. The officers are much gratified with the results of their experiments.

A decision was rendered by Judge Peabody in the St. Louis, Mo., Police Court, Wednesday, that under certain conditions a husband has the right to beat his wife. The case was of one Bernard Kretzer, charged with beating his wife because she would not agree with him in the management of their children, setting them bad examples.

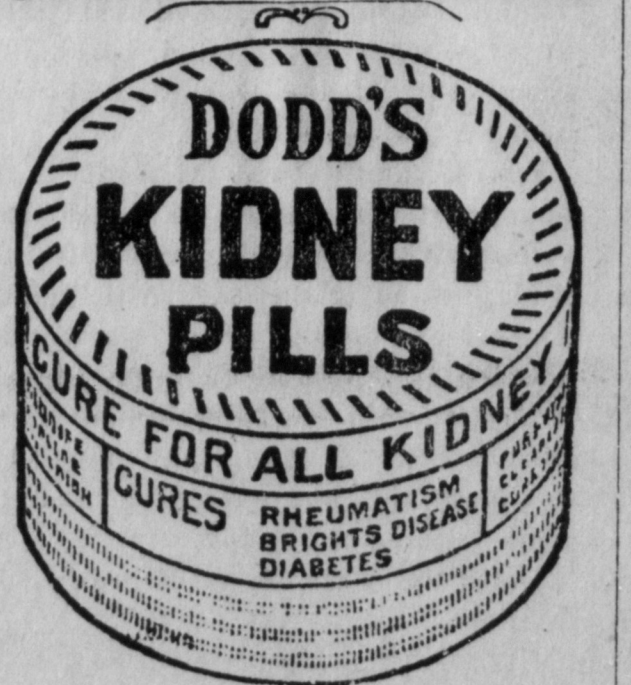
He begged for pity, but she was obdurate, and as he stumbled out into the unsympathetic night he was followed by a low mocking laugh.

PROVINCIAL PARLIAMENT.

energetic, ambitious community, to have a bridge erected connecting their town with Victoria, on the opposite side of the river. Provision was made for the forming of a stock company, and the object was to enable the government to guarantee the bonds, which would be issued by the company for the construction of the bridge. The bridge was to be a toll bridge, and provision was made that out of the tolls interest should be paid and a sinking fund provided for and any surplus after that would form

A PROFIT FOR THE SHAREHOLDERS.

The tolls would be very moderate and would be subject to the approval of the governor-in-council. The necessity for a bridge at Hartland arose largely from the fact that, owing to the proximity of the Beagunic stream, the ice in the main river did not freeze over solidly, making the crossing very insecure in winter, while in summer the water was often so low as to greatly interfere with the operation of the ferry. The country opposite Hartland was peopled by a very energetic class of farmers and the produce they had to ship from Hartland Station was very great. The residents of Hartland, of course, would like very much to have the government build a bridge for them, in the same way that bridges had been built at Woodstock, Florenceville and Andover, and no doubt this would be a convenient and desirable thing, but there was a limit to what the finances of the provinces would stand in this direction. There were many other localities, such as Newcastle, Miramichi, and the Washademoak Narrows, where the government had been pressed to build bridges yet the line had to be drawn somewhere. In this instance the people were willing to assume the responsibility of building the bridge themselves. They had the courage and pluck to take hold of the work, and he thought the government was justified in assuming the responsibility of guaranteeing the bonds because the people themselves were the ones who would pay the interest.

Mr. Hazen said if the people of Hartland were satisfied with this bill, they were satisfied with small favors. He (Hazen) thought they were fully as much entitled to have a bridge erected at the public expense as many other localities in the province.

Mr. Tweedie said, it may be that the people of Hartland ought to have a bridge built for them, but the difficulty was that our finances would not allow of it.

THE OPPOSITION WOULD NOT PROMISE.

Mr. Carvill said he was happy to see that the leader of the opposition had changed his mind. It was only four or five months ago that he addressed a public meeting at Hartland and neither he nor any person representing the opposition, not even the opposition candidates in Carleton, had declared in favor of the government making an expenditure of \$80,000 or \$100,000 on a permanent structure at Hartland.
Hon. Mr. Emmerson said even though the people of Hartland and vicinity had to pay toll it was much more to their advantage to pay a toll over a bridge than over a ferry. The remarks of the leader of the opposition would encourage people everywhere to put in a claim for bridges. Mr. Emmerson discussed the matter at length.

At the suggestion of Mr. Carvill the bill was amended, naming the company the Hartland Bridge Company, and fixing the number of directors at seven.

Agreed to with amendments.
Mr. Purdy introduced a bill amending chapter 68 of 35 Victoria and chapter 89 of 38 Victoria; and Mr. Robinson a bill relating to the value of the real and personal property of the Dominion Cotton Mills Company, (Limited), in the city of Moncton.
Adjourned.
