THE BOY AN IMPOSTER.—A boy about 14 years of age, who said his name was Hicks, applied for protection at the police station here about a fortnight ago and told a most pitiful story of ill-treatment received at the hands of a family with whom he had been living at Little River, Kent county. The Times is informed by some of the most reputable residents of the district that the only part of the boy's story that is true is his statement that he had run away from his adopted home. The truth is that the boy, who belongs in Moncton, when quite young was left with the Little River family for adoption. He was used, brought up as a member of the family, and sent to school, but as he grew older became quite unmanageable. Finally he ran away from home and lived for a time with a family near Moncton. About a year ago he returned to his Little River home, telling of ill-treatment while in this vicinity and was taken back but would not go to school and appeared to be less susceptible to reasonable discipline than before. He would frequently stay away from home over night and finally, about a fortnight ago, ran away a second time. The whereabouts of the boy's mother are at present unknown but it is thought she is somewhere in the United States.—Moncton Times.
