ACCIDENT AT MILLTOWN.—By an accident at Milltown Saturday evening two boys, Frank Osborne and Ernest Blackton, suffer a broken leg and other injuries, and a third boy, Thomas Smith, was slightly hurt. The old hand engine belonging to the Milltown fire department had been sold to the town of Princeton and was brought out for trial to see that it was in working order. On its return to the house the boys fell under the wheels and were run over. Osborne is a son of Jas. E. Osborne, town clerk.

DROWNING ACCIDENT.—Coroner E. A. Smith of Shediac, held an investigation last Thursday afternoon into the drowning of Jas. Hamill. Several witnesses were examined, but nothing came out to show that deceased had met with foul play. Though several had seen him on the wharf no one had seen him fall. A few gashes were found on the face, caused by striking the wharf in his descent. Dr. Denny, of Shediac, performed a post mortem and pronounced death from drowning. The jury rendered their verdict in accordance with the fact, accidental drowning.

COMPLAINS OF ILL TREATMENT.—A boy giving his name as Hicks, about 14 years of age, was given protection at the police station Saturday night. Officer Rushton found the lad wandering aimlessly about the streets, and in response to the officer's inquiries he said he had run away from the place where he had been living at Little River, Kent Co., on account of ill treatment. The officer gave the boy a square meal at Miss McGee's restaurant, sheltered him at the police station over night and turned him adrift in the morning. Young Hicks is apparently another of the unfortunates who has no friends to look after him.—Moncton Times.

DEATH OF JAMES WHITE.—James White died at the residence of his sister, Miss Mary White, in Kingston, Saturday morning, after a severe illness of seven weeks with laryngitis. Deceased has been identified with the fishing industry for nearly forty years. He and James Graham have been associated in the lobster business of late years, their factory being situated on the South Beach. Deceased was aged fifty-eight years and unmarried. The funeral took place Monday. Rev. D. Fraser conducted the services. The pall bearers were: Messrs. Hazen Russ, John Cameron, John P. Bell, Fred Peters, Thomas Bell and James Jardine.

NORTHUMBER'D PROBATE COURT.—In the estate of Elizabeth Wall, a suit by next of kin, Johanna Murphy against James D. Murphy, of Kouchibouguac, Kent Co., the administration of said estate in equity and for an account, &c., had been commenced 2nd Dec., 1898. E. Girouard, plaintiff's solicitor, R. A. Lawlor and W. C. Winslow appeared for the administrators. Subsequently on the 28th Dec., 1898, the administrators obtained a citation from the Probate Court of Northumberland to pass their account of administration, and on the 19th April, 1899, at the return of the citation before Sam. Thomson, Esq., Judge of said Probate Court. The plaintiff in the equity suit, took objection to the probate judge's jurisdiction to pass accounts of administration on the ground of administration suit in equity having commenced before the probate citation. The probate judge, with consent of proctors, took time to consider and on the first of June instant, at the adjourned Probate court at Newcastle, Judge Thomson sustained the objection of Mr. Girouard, and on the ground of no jurisdiction the citation for passing accounts in Probate court was dropped. The proceedings for administration of said estate will now proceed in the supreme court in equity, at the suit of said plaintiff, Johanna Murphy, vs. the administrators. The amount of the estate is between \$6,000 and \$7,000.

To the Editor of the Review:

DEAR SIR:—The midnight assassin and he who strikes in the back with a hidden hand are of the class that send venomous communications to the press and are too cowardly to write over their own signature. Indeed it is generally considered scarcely worth one's while to reply to such, but in the case of Rate Payer (?) writing in re "Those Licenses Again," and just for this once I beg to say, That Rate Payer seems to be in complete ignorance of what he is talking about and the whole of his letter is a misstatement of facts. For instance, no "woman who had sold her place to a Moncton man" was granted a license, neither was there granted a license to the "Man who withdrew his application because the people where he resided would not have a saloon in the community."

For the further information of Rate Payer I will add that under section thirty four of the License act the commissioners can meet at any time and at any place, and grant a license to any one they consider a fit and proper person, and who is entitled to have the license legally. The commissioners do not intend to trundle to those engaged in the hotel and saloon business, nor to clergymen who claim to take an active part in temperance work, while there are, no doubt, many very worthy people in both classes. We do not intend to be dictated to by them, and while we do not wish to be thought arbitrary, or offensive we will carry out the Liquor License Act of 1896 fearlessly according to what light we have.
