



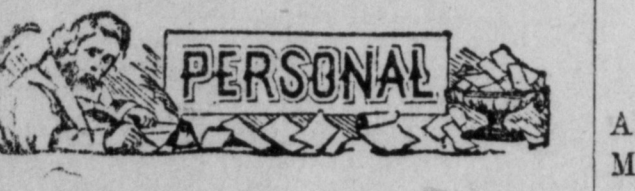

AGRICULTURAL MEETING.—At the annual meeting of the Agricultural Society held in Kingston on Saturday 7th inst., the following officers were appointed for the ensuing year:—Robt Main, President; F. S. Peters and R. Law, Vice Presidents; John Jardine, Secretary and Treasurer; W. H. McArthur, A. B. Carson, and H. Ferguson, Finance and Audit Committee. It was decided to import several pure bred bulls, one Ayrshire and the others Polled Angus, Short Horn, or other beef breeds. F. S. Peters, Sylvester Wathen, and the secretary, were authorized to purchase the bulls. Sylvester Wathen was chosen as the delegate to represent the society at the meeting of Farmers' and Dairymen's Association at Fredericton.

DEATH OF MRS. BELL.—Mrs. Bell, wife of John P. Bell, Esq., died at her home in Richibucto early Tuesday morning after an illness of about two months duration. Mrs. Bell whose maiden name was Charity Ann McQuarrie, was born at Kouchibouguac in March, 1840. She was therefore in her 59th year. The deceased was highly esteemed by a large number of friends and acquaintances for her kindness. She leaves six sons and one daughter, besides her husband. The bereaved husband and family have the sincere sympathy of the whole community. The funeral will take place to-day, (Thursday) at 2 o'clock p. m. The interment will be made in the Protestant cemetery here.

It is rumored that the northern section of this county will have Mr. E. Comeau in the field as a candidate at the coming local general election.

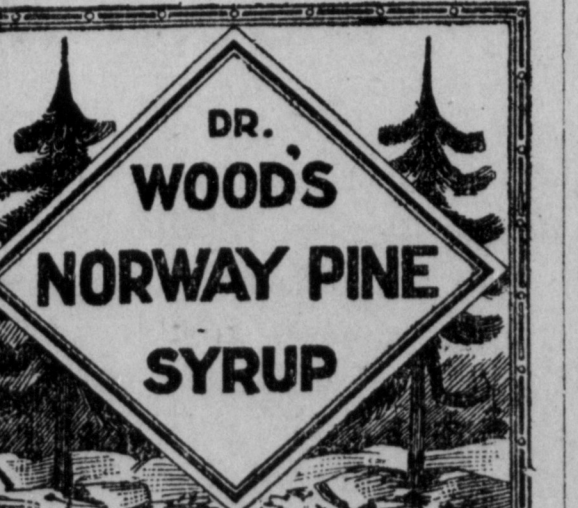

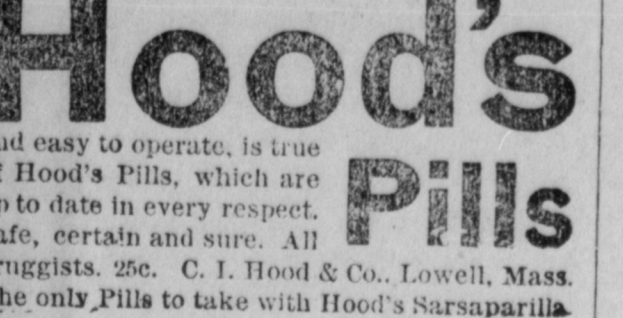
—The Fredericton Reporter says:—"Teachers' contracts in some respects strongly favor the teacher. Should the Trustees fail to give a month's notice to quit, before the end of the School year, the teacher has a position guaranteed for another twelve months. Should the teacher fail to give like notice of course the operations work the same way. And now it seems that C. A. Acheson of the Moncton school trustees for the vacancy on the teaching staff which Jos. Mills of Keswick had to decline on account of his present engagement at Keswick."

—Canada holds the record for the successful cultivation of wheat in high latitudes. This year in her Northwest Territories wheat has grown further north than ever before there or anywhere else in the world, so far as is known. At Fort Providence on the Mackenzie River, a few miles east of Great Bear Lake, there is a Roman Catholic mission which this summer grew what is termed "a very fine wheat crop." The wheat was sown and harvested within ninety-one days. Fort Providence is just above the sixty-second parallel of latitude, three hundred and fifty miles south of the Arctic circle, and less than two hundred miles south of the latitude of Dawson City, in the Yukon district. It is about six hundred miles north of Edmonton, and more than one hundred miles north of the northern frontier of the territory of Athabaska. The latitude of Winnipeg is, roughly speaking about three hundred miles north of Montreal, that of Edmonton is about two hundred and fifty miles north of Winnipeg, so that of Fort Providence is eleven hundred and fifty miles north of Montreal.

#### KENT COUNTY COUNCIL.

The regular annual meeting of the Kent County council took place in the courthouse on Tuesday 10th inst., at 2 o'clock p. m., Warden Murphy presiding. The councillors for the different parishes are:—

Carleton—Clifford Atkinson, Martin H. Daigle. Acadiaville—Abram Pineau, Sylvain Barreau. St. Louis—F. M. Richard, Urbain Babineau. Richibucto—R. W. Mitchell, J. F. Richard. Weidford—Robt. Murphy, Alex. Murray. Harcourt—L. J. Wathen, Robert Saunier. Wellington—John McKee, F. X. LeBlanc. St. Mary's—S. S. Leger, M. D. Cormier. St. Paul—Anselme D. LeBlanc, Premilite Johnson. Dundas—L. L. Leger, Juddus Robichaud.

After the minutes of the last session had been read and approved, it was resolved that the finance committee consist of one councillor from each parish. The Warden named Couns. Atkinson, Pineau, Babineau, J. F. Richard, Murray, Wathen, Johnson, S. S. Leger, McKee and L. L. Leger finance committee.

It was resolved that Thos. Frecker be appointed constable to attend sessions of council at \$1.00 per day.

Resolved that constable procure stationery for the use of council.

Coun. F. M. Richard brought up the matter of reporting and printing the proceedings of the Council. After some discussion by Couns. Atkinson, McKee, L. L. Leger and the Warden, it was moved by Coun. McKee, seconded by Coun. J. F. Richard that THE REVIEW get \$35 00 for reporting and publishing the proceedings and printing 200 French pamphlets the same as last year. Carried.

It was agreed between THE REVIEW and the council that the French pamphlets be delivered to the Secretary on or before April 1 '99.

Coun. F. M. Richard moved, seconded by Coun. Babineau, that the financial standing of the different parishes be published in THE REVIEW and pamphlets. Carried.

Coun. L. L. Leger called attention to the difficulty of enforcing the by law prohibiting cattle running at large. The Clerk of the Peace said that the existing law was sufficient, if carried out—that parties violating the law in that respect could be dealt with under the Summary Convictions Act.

Coun. McKee suggested that some means be taken to compel collectors of rates to report to the Secretary and send a monthly statement together with the moneys collected during that period. Coun. Atkinson thought that all taxes should be paid by October 1. Warden Murphy said that the act was good enough if the right kind of collectors were appointed. Mr. Secretary reads by law and explains. Coun. Murray thought the assessors were to blame for collectors not reporting promptly. Coun. F. M. Richard blamed the councillors for appointing inferior men as collectors. Coun. Atkinson, Murray, Wathen and J. F. Richard spoke on the subject but no action was taken.

Coun. McKee moved, seconded by Coun. Babineau that the full board visit the wreck of the public wharf at 1:30 o'clock to-morrow. Carried.

Moved by Coun. McKee, seconded by Coun. Babineau that council adjourn to allow Finance Committee to organize. Carried.
