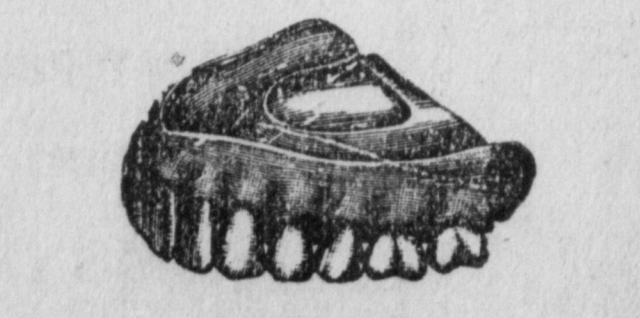

## GENERAL NEWS.

Baire, Ont., has decided to abolish the ward system.

Cold Stream, Ont., has voted against local option which it has had for years.

Lord Strathcona and Mount Royal, has given \$5,000 to the Catholic High school of Montreal.

Lord Strathcona and Mount Royal is still very ill at his residence, Montreal but hopes to be able to sail for England next week.

Iron ore shipments from Lake Superior were 1,200,000 tons greater in 1898 than the previous year.

During 1898 the Pope received presents of money and valuables amounting to more than \$2,000,000. The Peter's Pence fund reached \$800,000.

A serious revolution is now proceeding in the Republic of Bolivia. The transit trade by way of Mollendo, Peru, is interrupted. Ecuador also is much disturbed but Peru is perfectly tranquil.

An explosion of gas followed by a fire at the Ohio and Indiana Pipe Line Company's compressing station near Red Key, Ind., caused a loss estimated at \$100,000. Engineer Robertson was badly burned.

The Labor Commissioner, of Missouri, reports that 70 per cent. of the women applying for work at the public employment bureau in St. Louis have deserted their husbands or been deserted by them.

The Asbest Manufacturing Company, of Boston, with woolen mills at Maynard, has made an assignment for the benefit of its creditors. The liabilities, according to the July statement, amounting to \$3,081,161, including \$1,000,000 capital stock.

The Reform Club of Montreal has proposed to tender a banquet to the American and Canadian Members of the joint commission at the Windsor hotel, on the completion of its labors. Sir Wilfrid Laurier has been requested to extend the invitation to his fellow members.

At Cincinnati, Ohio, Judge Holster has reversed the police court ruling in the Christian Science case of Harriet Evans and freed her. The court holds that the rites she performed were religious and not medical, and therefore not within the jurisdiction of the law under which she was prosecuted.

The announcement has been made on the highest authority that Hon. Joseph P. Choate, of New York, will be named U. S. ambassador to Great Britain. The nomination will not be sent to the senate for a few days but those near the president say this delay does not indicate any possibility of a change in his plans.

The value of ore produced by the Rossland, B. C. mines during the year just ended reached the enormous aggregate total of \$2,804,750.12. The shipments were 116,697 tons, for the year ending December 21, 1897 the shipments were 68,000 tons and the value of the ore mined was \$2,200,000. In a single year the shipments from the mines were almost doubled while the value of the output increased \$700,000 of 33 per cent.

A large China Manufacturer of England after testing samples of Canadian felpar forwarded by the director of the geological survey has ordered a trial shipment of several tons in order to subject it to a full test. The chances for upholding trade in this article hinges on the cost of transportation from Canada, as the Scandinavian articles is being put on the market at a very cheap price.

Agents for the Weissbach Company are reported in Vancouver to be negotiating for platinum in the province. It is declared that large quantities of platinum are found in Granite Creek, where hydraulic mining is going on. It is believed that the platinum will be found in the black sand of the Fraser River. This metal has been overlooked in the rush for gold.

R. S. Alexander, banker, of Treherne, slipped from the platform of a caboose, on Friday night in the yards, thinking he was approaching the station, and his feet were caught by the wheels. Several toes were cut off, and he received other injuries, from which he died at the hospital. He was a native of Truro, N. S., and was 37 years of age. He carried \$27,000 insurance, and leaves a large estate.

J. K. Stewart, license inspector of Ontario believes that Ontario has the most sober population in the world. As an indication of the diminution of drunkenness, Mr. Stewart says that ten years ago the convictions for Drunkenness numbered 7,059. This year 2,465 convictions were made. Ten years ago 4,700 people were committed for drunkenness. This year 1,707 were committed. The statistics apply only to Ontario.

A bacteriologist applied recently to the Australian Government for permission to open a college for experimenting on cats, rats, mice, birds and fowl with germs of smallpox, plague, typhoid fever, glanders and rinderpest. The various Governments have refused his requests and the New South Wales Government has announced that any person importing disease germs into the country will be fined and imprisoned. Dr. Hayden, who introduced the bubonic plague virus into Victoria, is being severely criticized by the Victoria Government.

A tourist association is to be organized for Quebec.

Rudyard Kipling and family will visit America January 25.

Mayor Andrews of Winnipeg fell Monday and broke his arm.

The Hamilton Board of Trade is enquiring into ideal assessment laws.

Archbishop Duhamel of Ottawa has made a declaration against Sunday cars.

Hanson Bros' syndicate, of Montreal, has taken possession of the Havana street railway.

A congress to discuss the annihilation of tuberculosis will convene at Berlin, Germany, May 23rd.

There are three suits of damages against the city of London, Ont., as a result of the city hall catastrophe of a year ago.

A letter in the New York World on Christmas day purporting to be from Sir Wilfrid Laurier has been pronounced a forgery.

Wm. Hubbell, of Havelock, Ont., was shot and instantly killed by Harry Cole, of Ottawa. It was a case of fooling with a loaded gun.

Last week a night refuge was inaugurated by the Central Labor club at 1517 at Notre Dame street and during the week 520 persons received lodging.

Smallpox is epidemic in Cleveland, O. There were 52 cases on Christmas day. Steps are being taken to prevent the disease crossing the Canadian border.

The Michigan Central Railway company has been censured by the coroner's jury at Canfield, Ont., for having such a dangerous crossing as the one at which Peter Follick lost his life.

The Customs Department has refused the petition of the Quebec Board of Trade to defer bringing into force the new regulations, and they were consequently enforced there for the first time on Tuesday.

The report of the Board of Health of the city of Quebec for 1898 is a very satisfactory one and shows a very creditable state of sanitary affairs. The total number of contagious disease cases reported was 533 and the deaths 76, or 14.2 per cent.

Captain McDonald of the Fredericton School of Infantry, has arrived at Kingston, Ont., to instruct the 47th Battalion while in Fort Henry. Sergt Instructor Welmer, of the Toronto School of Infantry will act as sergeant major. A bugler will also be attached from the Toronto School.

The Royal Foresters' trumpet band of Toronto, serenaded Dr. Oronhyatekha, S. C. R.; Thos. Lawless, Ass. D. C. R., and C. A. Stone, of the Independent Order of Foresters on New Year's eve. Just as the clock was striking the hour of 12, the band formed on the corner of King and Yonge and sounded the royal salute and then marched to their band room. Dr. Oronhyatekha initiated 153 new Foresters at Detroit on Thursday evening, and a telegram was received late Saturday evening stating that 125 had been obligated at San Francisco that day.

## A VANITY BOOK.

Personal Record Keeping Whose Interest Excuses Its Vanity.

In the beginning one's parents must be the authors, or if the parents will not then some devoted aunt may win for herself the warmest thanks in years to come. As the child developed the character of the items naturally changed. When she went to school, her early efforts supplied more material, sometimes in the shape of school work and sometimes as stories of childish temptations or griefs and joys. Heart's Delight's first letter is entered in the book.

There are so many tokens here that are treasures, more valuable as they grow older. The first invitation to a party, the first theater programme, and with these are other programmes of those things which have impressed the child. Her first party dress, of course, was shown in the book. Throughout the book are photographs of Heart's Delight herself as she grew toward childhood and of the girls and boys who were her friends.

Long ago the bookmaking fell into the hands of the girl herself, and she adds to it all that points to the story she is making. Everything of pleasure, of special benefit in her life, is to be recalled from this book, and even now she prizes it above all her possessions. What will it be to her when she is 50? What will it be worth to her son or daughter when some one writes "Fini" to it for her? What would you not give for such a book left you by your mother or father? It would be worth more than money.

There is a great deal of pleasure to be found in making such a book for oneself, though if one begins it after childhood he loses much that went into the little one's book. It will become filled, however, with the important things of life, each making these for himself. A vanity book is one of the best things in the world to show how one's ideas of values change and how life's horizon expands. It records a life with some of those which preceded it and gave it its bent and those which accompanied and developed it. Though it may be vanity, it is yet a vanity with a lesson.—New York Sun.

## THE SEA FISHERIES.

DO THE PROVINCES OF THE DOMINION NOW CONTROL THEM?

OTTAWA, January 6.—The Premiers of Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, and New Brunswick, with Attorney General Longley, of Nova Scotia, and Messrs. Tweedie and White, of New Brunswick, left for home yesterday, after having had long interviews with a committee of the Council on fishery matters.

The most debatable of the points that came up for consideration at the conference between the Maritime Province Premiers and Sir Louis Davies was as to whether the decision of the Privy Council contemplates a transfer of the sea fisheries within the three mile limit from the Dominion to the Maritime Provinces, and whether the provinces are justified in claiming the right to administer the fishery boundary derived from the interest on the Halifax award. If the provinces assume control of the fisheries within the three mile limit and collect the revenues therefrom, the duty of protecting these fisheries from foreign spoliation would be imposed upon them and international complications might arise from a transference of this duty to the provinces. The probability is that in any event the Dominion will retain control of the fishery protection service, but the Dominion cannot maintain the service without collecting the revenues.

It is likely that the provinces will be allowed to issue licenses for salmon fishing in the rivers and beyond their mouths and for the oyster fisheries in the small bays, the Dominion Government continuing to regulate and control the lobster fishery.

The result of the conference was an agreement to refer the decision of the Privy Council to the Department of Justice for interpretation upon unsettled points, and if the report prove unsatisfactory to either party a test case will be taken to the Supreme Court. No change will take place in the present system of control until the meaning of the decision has been determined and provincial legislation has been adopted, providing local administrative machinery.
