FARMERS' INSTITUTE MEETINGS.

At the Harcourt Farmer's Institute meeting on Saturday night last, Hon. C. H. Labilloy, Commissioner of Agriculture, addressed the meeting in eloquent terms of which the following is a very brief synopsis:

"He wished to dismiss from the minds of his hearers the idea that he was before them on an election Campaign. The only politics he would discuss would be agriculture, and as these meetings had been arranged long before there was any talk of election and so could not be said to be got not up for election purposes. In assisting the Farmer's and Dairy men's Association to hold these meetings the Government was following the example of the best agriculture countries in the world.

"Some men say they do not see any good results from the work of the Government for agriculture. Well, for one answer he could say that the Government's Dairy policy had increased the output of cheese in this province from 63 tons in 1891 to 825 tons in 1898. This was fairly satisfactory and he hoped that the present efforts of his Department would increase the butter making business to the same extent as cheese has reached. He could further say that he was particularly pleased with the first year's result of the Government's wheat growing policy. In Restigouche county to-day the dealers told him that they were not selling one barrel of flour to the farmers; this time last year they were selling ten, this meant that much money was kept in the county and would be spent for comforts in the homes.

"He would urge the farmers of Harcourt to form an Agricultural Society or a local Farmers and Dairy men's Association, and so get some advantage from the Government grants. He would also urge them to procure all the agricultural information they could obtain by any legitimate means.

"The aim of these meetings was to convey information to those who would attend, and he would say that if at any time the people in this district or any part of Kent County would like to have one of these meetings to discuss any particular subject, he would try to send them a man who would be useful.

"Then there was a valuable medium of information. He referred to good Agricultural papers. The best paper in his opinion for the people of New Brunswick was the "Co-operative Farmer" of Sussex, N. B., and he would like to see it in every farm home in the province. It was a paper devoted to the interests of the farmers, and our farmers could through it speak to the Dominion or Provincial Governments, and he could say that when the farmers spoke the Governments were always prepared to listen.

"He would also draw their attention to the opening of the Dairy School at Sussex, N. B., where on the 21st Feb. opportunity would be afforded all the young men and the young women of the province of learning butter and cheese making and all matters connected with keeping dairy cows. There would be no charge for tuition and any one could attend and stay ten days or longer. In conclusion he asked the farmers of the province to support the efforts of the Government in trying to put our agriculture upon the best possible basis to help the farmers to make more money from their farms, to help develop the export trade of the county and not only help the farmers but also our seaport towns by bringing in foreign gold. He felt that the patriotic sense of our people would back up the Government in its efforts to make our own province one of the best countries to live in all our world-wide empire. (Loud and continued applause)
