—The failures in the Dominion last week numbered thirty-two, against fifty-three in the corresponding week last year.

—It is stated in well informed political circles that parliament will meet about February fifteenth for the despatch of business.

—The new locomotive recently purchased from the L. C. Railway for use on the Kent Northern R. R., arrived here last week and is highly satisfactory.

—Mr. William Brittain, of Kingston, wishes to thank the Quebec Insurance Company for the prompt payment of the \$800 the amount of insurance on account of the loss by fire of his dwelling house on the 2nd inst.

—On Tuesday the traffic on Queen St. was practically stopped for a short time by a countryman's sled. He had stood his rig crosswise of the street and proceeded to feed his horse. Such things should not be tolerated.

—Action has been taken at Toronto by the Athabaska Coal and Railway Company against McKenzie and Mann for \$100,000 alleged to be due for rails and rolling stock supplied in connection with the Crow's Nest Pass Road.

—Chatham World: There is not a word of truth in the report, started by some irresponsible person, that Mr. Jas. Robinson, M. P., is an applicant for the vacant seat in the Senate, but it is understood that he has strongly recommended a North Shore man for the seat.

—In the Quebec Legislature on Friday the minister of public works announced that the government would grant no bonuses to railways this year and would not carry out the promises made by the late government. Included in these promises is one of a bonus for the new Grand Trunk bridge to replace the Victoria bridge.

—The substructure of the Kingston bridge is fast approaching completion. It is probable that the middle of February will see it all finished. The superstructure will be put up as soon as danger of frost is over. The long span (308 feet) will be the longest on any highway bridge in Canada. Altogether the structure will reflect great credit on the Government and contractors.

—Hon. Mr. Turner's motion condemning the action of the lieutenant governor in dismissing the late government was again postponed by the British Columbia Legislature Thursday night, as Hon. Mr. Turner has resigned owing to a breach of the election act. It is hardly likely the motion will be proceeded with. The public accounts show a net revenue of \$1,439,663, an expenditure of \$2,001,031. The liabilities over assets of the province are \$4,845,413.

—Jas. Tufts, of Sussex, has been troubled with his stomach for some weeks past and a few days ago was taken with quite a severe attack of vomiting and was unable to keep anything on his stomach. He received some medicine at the hands of Dr. McAllister, and on Monday vomited from his stomach a dead lizard eight inches in length. It is supposed Mr. Tufts took this into his stomach at a small reservoir from which he used to get drinking water when living above upper corner.

—A run off occurred on the L. C. R. Saturday between Millstream and Causapsal on the St. Flavie district. An accommodation coming to Campbellton left the rails in a rock cutting, and a number of cars were damaged. On account of the wreck the English mail special had to be transferred on Sunday as well as the Maritime express leaving here Saturday night. No person was injured and fortunately the run off occurred in a rock cutting instead of on the steep embankment near the place of the accident.

—The Boston Comedy Company, under the well-known and popular manager, H. Price Webber, will be in the Temperance hall, Richibucto, on next Tuesday evening, January 31 and the following evening, February 1. Mr. Webber and his excellent company are well-known to Richibucto and Kingston audiences, and we feel assured that the people of this town and vicinity will appreciate the treat in store for them and greet the favorite with a full house. The company will open in Kingston on Thursday, Feb. 2.

AS OTHERS SEE US.

Munsey's Magazine for January shows a splendid full page engraving of Sir Wilfrid Laurier as a Frontispiece. This magazine published in New York, with probably the largest circulation of any periodical in the United States, opens with an article on Sir Wilfrid, which we copy in full in order to give our readers an opportunity of judging of the opinions held and the views expressed by our neighbors of the Republic to the South of us of our great Leader.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier's visit to Washington as a member of the Canadian treaty commission was the logical result—as indeed was the commission itself—of the policy of which he has long been the foremost champion in the Dominion. He has always sought to maintain the most amicable commercial and political relations with this country, and his friendly attitude as premier of Canada has contributed to the recent development of good feeling between the nations that speak the English tongue. He said the other day, in the presence of President McKinley, that the British Empire and the United States are now united by the strongest bonds of brotherhood, and that henceforth the starry banner and the union jack will float side by side in defense of right and justice. Sir Wilfrid is no new convert to this doctrine of Anglo-Saxon good will; he has preached it ever since he has been in public life.

So many are the conflicting interests to be reckoned with, on both sides of the frontier, that the commission's task has proved a peculiarly delicate and difficult one; but whether its success be great or small, it is a step in the right direction. If it does not succeed in removing all causes of controversy, it will at least have cleared the ground for a better mutual understanding; and the credit for this will be mainly due to the man who was its chief originator.

Sir Wilfrid is a lawyer by profession. He lives very unpretentiously in the little town of Athabaskaville, Quebec. Respected throughout the Dominion for his abilities as an orator and an administrator, and for his spotless public record, in his own province he is nothing less than a popular idol.
