Clam (Quahaug) and oyster raking are extensively carried on. The clams are sold at 80c per barrel, and a man can dig from two to four barrels in a day. They are taken by boat to Point du Chene, and sold there to American speculators. At this rate of consumption, it will be strange if our waters are not soon as bare of clams as they are of oysters. The present low price of clams forcibly reminds us of a similarity of circumstances in regard to oysters some years ago. At that time, they could be brought here at rediculously low prices, and it was not until the waters were almost depleted, that alarm was taken, and parliamentary interference was called for. Then, when too late, did we find that oysters had a vast commercial value.


The two saw mills, the butter factory and the flour mill are hard at work.
