BIG FIRE IN KINGSTON.—A little before noon on Monday, fire broke out in the residence of Mr. Wm. Britain on Brait St., Kingston. The building consisted of Mr. Britain's residence and three tenement houses under one roof, all of wood. The citizens turned out quickly and succeeded in rescuing the furniture from the burning building. From Britain's building the fire soon spread and caught on the large warehouse, store and dwelling of the late Hon. O. McInerney, which building was also soon in flames. The people of the village and vicinity strove heroically to prevent the fire from spreading to adjacent buildings. The heat from the burning houses was so intense that it was difficult to go near them and although the weather was below zero, all the snow on the street was melted making water with which to fight the flames. Telephone calls were sent to Richibucto for the fire engine, but as the wires were not working well, it took some time before communication could be had. The engine was sent from here, but before it arrived the fire was under control. The Britain house is said to have been fully insured, but there was no insurance on the McInerney buildings.
