SEVERE STORM.

LONDON, Dec. 31.—Violent storms prevail along the English channel to-night and all cross channel service is suspended.

HIGHLAND LIGHT, Mass., Jan. 1.—A severe north gale, accompanied by rain began here early last evening and later a drop in the temperature changed the rain to sleet and snow. Several inches of the latter fell during the night.

No marine disasters have been reported along the Cape.

PROVINCETOWN, Mass., Jan. 1.—A heavy northeast gale set in late yesterday afternoon and at night the rain turned to blinding snow. The gale increased to almost a hurricane at dark and blew hard all night. This afternoon the wind backed to the north and decreased somewhat, but snow squalls were frequent nearly all day.

The government telephone line connecting all the life saving stations between here and Chatham is in good working order and up to dark to-night no wrecks had been reported. A number of vessels came into the harbor for shelter last night and rode out the gale in safety.

CONCORD, N. H., Jan. 1.—The second heavy storm of the winter buried this section of the state under sixteen inches of snow last night and materially impeded both steam and electric car service. The wind blew a gale nearly all day and to-night the thermometer threatens to drop away below zero.

CHATHAM, Mass., Jan. 1.—A northeast gale has continued with increasing force last night and to-day. Rain changed to snow at midnight and continued all day, but to-night, it falls only in squalls. Wind changing northerly, much colder. No disasters are reported along the coast.

PORTLAND, Me., Jan. 1.—The mercury began falling in Portland Saturday morning, and toward noon a snow storm set in. Enough fell to make good sleighing, the ground having been bare for most of the winter up to this time. To-night the temperature is down to zero with a clear sky and no wind to speak of.

BANGOR, Me., Jan. 1.—The cold wave arrived here on Saturday evening, accompanied by a driving snow storm. The mercury to-day registered as follows: 7 a. m., 7 below; noon, 1 below; 6 p. m., 13 below. The snow fall amounts to about five inches on a level.

AUGUSTA, Me., Jan. 2.—The cold snap struck here Saturday night. There were several snow storms through the day and Sunday. About six inches of snow has fallen. The mercury has steadily dropped, so that at 1 o'clock it is 15 below zero.

BOSTON, Jan. 1.—The heavy northeast snow storm of yesterday, which prevailed throughout New England and caused a fall of from four to twenty inches of snow was followed to-day by a decided drop in the temperature and at 10 o'clock to-night the mercury was at zero or below that point throughout Massachusetts and to the north. In this city the temperature did not rise much over 13 degrees above zero during the day and after three o'clock in the afternoon fell steadily. The day proved to be the coldest during the present winter, but the indications are for milder weather within the next two days.

The snow fall in the northern tier of states was quite heavy, over 16 inches being recorded at Concord, N. H. The lowest temperature reported was at Augusta, Me., 15 below zero at ten o'clock to-night.

TRICKS OF MEMORY.

Notable Examples of Forgetfulness That Are Supposed to Be True.

Lobster Fishery Bay of Fundy.

PUBLIC NOTICE is particularly directed to the following Special Fishery Regulation approved by His Excellency the Governor General in Council, on the eighth day of July, 1898, fixing the legal size limit under which the capture of lobsters in the waters of the Bay of Fundy is prohibited.

"From and after the 1st day of January, 1899, on and along that part of the coast of the province of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, extending from Cape Sable in a westerly and north-westerly direction, to and including the whole coast of the Bay of Fundy and following that coast to the International Boundary Line between the province of New Brunswick and the State of Maine, and including also the coast of all the islands, lying in such Bay of Fundy and the waters of Canada in such Bay and between the above points, it shall be unlawful to fish for 'catch, kill, buy, sell, can, cure, preserve, or have in possession for any purpose whatever, any lobster or lobsters under 10 1/2 inches in length, measured from head to tail, exclusive of claws or feelers.'"

The above regulation does not come into force until the 1st January, 1899, but this notice is designed to furnish all persons interested with timely and ample intimation that on and after that date it will be rigidly enforced under the extreme penalties provided by the Fisheries Act, Chapter 55 Revised Statutes of Canada.
