### ANOTHER SEA TRAGEDY.

SOUTHAMPTON, Apr. 1.—The passenger steamer Stella, plying between this port and the Channel Islands, crashed upon the dreaded Casquet rocks, near the island of Alderney, Thursday afternoon in a dense fog, and foundered in 10 minutes, her boilers exploding with a tremendous report as she went down. It is believed that 60 persons were drowned. The coasting steamer Lynx, which brought the news of the disaster here, picked up four boats and 40 persons belonging to the Stella.

Later accounts say that the Stella had 140 passengers on board and that her crew numbered 42 persons. Another steamer of the same company, which arrived at the Island of Jersey at noon Friday, reports having passed many bodies of victims in the disaster about Casquet Rocks. A survivor of the Stella named Bush says the speed of the vessel in the fog was not diminished, though the fog whistles were sounded. Bush adds that at 3 30 p. m., the engineer showed him in the engine room a dial registering a speed of 18 1/2 knots and that the vessel struck within 25 minutes afterwards. Bush further asserts that two life-boats were sunk with the steamer, which, after resting on the rocks for 10 or 15 minutes, split.

### IN TWO AND DISAPPEARED.

Continuing, Bush said: "When the Stella disappeared forty or fifty persons were discovered clinging to pieces of wreckage or cabin furniture and crying piteously for help. All the passengers and crew had been provided with life belts and there was little panic as the ship sank. I first slipped into the water and then swam to one of the boats, into which I was helped. We rowed supposedly in the direction of Guernsey, but seven hours later found ourselves near the scene of the wreck and saw dozens of persons clinging to the rocks. The boat in which Bush was a passenger was afterwards picked up by the Lynx. The passengers all agree that perfect order and discipline prevailed on board the Stella. The crew promptly took up their stations when the steamer struck, served out the life belts and lowered the boats. The scene at the moment of the sinking of the vessel was heartrending, women were screaming and praying and people were clinging to spars and other wreckage in other directions. The voice of Captain Rooks from the bridge was frequently heard urging the rowers to pull for their lives. The boats were adrift for 15 hours, during which time their occupants were without food or water, and, as their clothes were drenched, they suffered greatly. The disaster is generally attributed to the high speed at which the steamer was travelling in the fog.

### ALBERT CO. COAL DEPOSITS.

TO BE DEVELOPED BY NEW YORK CAPITALISTS.

Mr. J. R. McDonald, the New York capitalist, returned to Moncton yesterday from Fredericton. While at the capital, he was interviewed by a Gleaner reporter. As is known to many persons in New Brunswick many thousands of dollars have been expended in prospecting and developing the oil deposits at Baltimore mines, in Albert county. It is also quite well known that those thousands of dollars have not as yet yielded to the investors a paying percentage upon their investment, and that the oil works at the place named have been abandoned and that Westmorland county is to be the scene of the next operations in the search for oil.

Mr. McDonald and those associated with him believe, however, that the oil which undoubtedly exists here is but a by-product of a more valuable mineral which exists in almost unlimited quantities and of incalculable value. Ever since the prospecting for oil began in Albert county it has been known that coal, or shale as it is called, was found in large quantities. Some people even took the trouble to ascertain that this shale was good for fuel, but so engrossed were the oil men in their enterprise that they paid little attention to what is now believed to be one of the most valuable coal deposits ever discovered, and Mr. McDonald and those associated with him are undertaking the development, mining and marketing of this coal.

The nature and quality of the coal is said to be unlike anything yet discovered elsewhere and much superior to the best Scotch canal coal for some purposes. It is particularly valuable for mixing with other coal for the production of illuminating gas. In this connection it is known that the gas works had a carload of the Albert coal mined and transported to Moncton and that fourteen per cent. of the provincial product mixed with the other coal in the production of gas gave better results than the very best Scotch article. Limitless quantities of this exceedingly valuable coal are said to exist right near the surface. That taken out thus far has been picked from a seam in the side of an immense hill or small mountain exposed by the rushing waters of a gorge. A similar seam of the coal is shown on the other side of the mountain and veins of it crop out on the very top of the hill, so that the reasonable conclusion is formed that the whole mountain is a solid mass of coal. A competent engineer who was sent by the promoters to look over the ground, estimates that two hundred million tons of the coal are in sight and the real depth and extent of the deposit has not yet been tested.

Mr. McDonald came here in the interests of a number of gentlemen who are associated with him in developing this coal deposit, and having looked over the ground he is much more sanguine of the success of the enterprise than before he left New York. He will return to New York almost immediately and organize his company, the capital stock of which will be about \$1,000,000. The company will immediately proceed with the erection of works and the development of their property, and they expect to spend \$200,000 before they are in a position to put their product upon the market in any quantities. The nearest railway point to the deposit is the Harvey and Salisbury railway, eight miles distant, which connects with the Intercolonial railway, and the coal company will either purchase the Harvey and Salisbury road or build direct to the I. C. R., a distance of sixteen miles. The company will also need a water front and may make Moncton their shipping headquarters. By next fall the company expect to be shipping 1000 tons of coal a day from their mine, and in a year from now they calculate that their output will be 3000 tons a day, and that the enterprise will give employment to 3000 men. Mr. McDonald before his return to New York will probably interview the Minister of Railways regarding shipping rates over the Intercolonial railway.

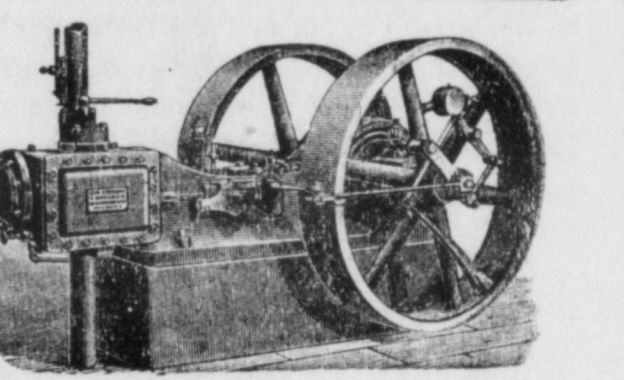

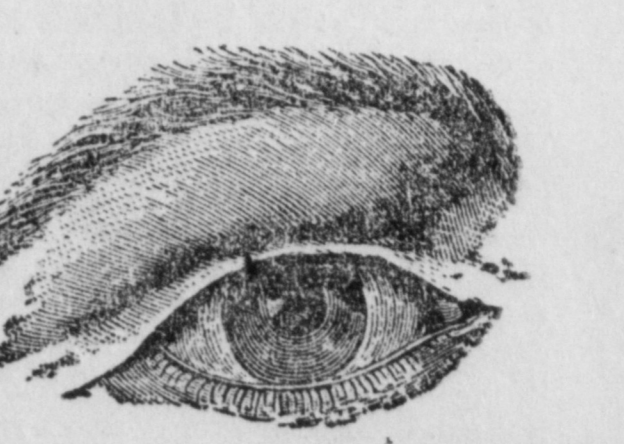
