BANDITS CAPTURED.

SANTIAGO DE CUBA, April 4.-Four bandits, among them Antonio Nunez, a notorious desperado, was captured five miles from San Luis, Thursday, after a lively fight with men of the 9th immune regiment. Yesterday they were brought here and locked up. The Plomouto estate, near Cobre, was visited by eleven brigands yesterday morning and a store on the estate was looted. In this instance there was no fighting. A regular battle, however, bas taken place near Holguin between the bandits and the men of the one soldier being killed. Further serious trouble is anticipated at Holguin and Guantanamo.

FIELDING AT TORONTO.

TORONTO, April 4.-Hon. Mr. Fielding was the chief speaker at the young Liberal banquet last evening. He dealt fully with the Yukon charges, deploring what he termed the shocking outrage of the speech of Sir Hibbert Tupper. He maintained the government acted for the best in selecting for the administration of the Yukon the best men it could lay hold of. He declared Tupper had not made a defi- nitv nite specific charge against Siften. If ne would lay charges in parliament against him there would be an inquiry at once Mr. Fielding announced the government would have larger surplus than has been in a current year. He anticipated that the I. C. R. will pay its way soon.

FIRST TO GROW ORANGES.

Jesuits Introduced Them Into the Pelican State.

The orange of Louisiana is an exceptionally fine variety of that fruit, and commands a good price in the market. The orange was first introduced into colonial Louisiana by the Jesuits, having been first grown by the members of the society on their grounds, which formerly comprised that part of the city of New Orleans which constitutes the ower part of the first district, down to Common street.

While St. Lernard and Plaquemines arishes are the chief centers of the range culture of Louisiana, the fruit ulso grows well in the parishes of Oreans, Jefferson, St. James, St. John Baptist, St. Charles, Assumption, St. Mary, Terrebonne, Lafourche, Vermilion. Cameron, Iberia and Sabine. The orange tree begins to bear at about the seventh year, although it is not reckoned to have reached its full growth until its twelfth or fifteenth year.

The orange culture in Louisiana is probably the most profitable industry of the state under favorable conditions, a full grown tree producing from 3,000 to 5,000 oranges, the fruit on the tree generally selling for \$10 a thousand, and as some of the largest orchards in the state yield as many as 3,000,000 oranges their market value gives a princely income to the owners of the trees. Comparatively a very small acreage of the state is devot. I to the growth of oranges-possibly not more than

The sweetness, delicacy and juiciness of the Louisiana orange, the best of which are regarded in the markets outside of Louisiana as superior to even the oranges of Cuba, to which island the fruit is indigenous, render the Louisiana oranges highly prized in the north and west of the United States, so much so that the supply is not by any means equal to the demand. - New Orleans

TAYLOURS AND SMYTHS.

They Were the Commonest Transs In the Thirteenth Century.

The manufacture of leather in the thirteenth century seems to have been important, showing that leather jerkins and breeches were commonly worn. We have 19 skynners, 40 barkars, 6 saddelers, 3 cordeweners, 167 souters, (shoemakers) and 8 glovers. The sura maker of pack saddles.

The commonest trades are taylour and smyth, since one lived in almost every village. The taylours number 407, of whom 140 are called by the Latin name of cissor. In addition to 261 smyths, several are specialized. There are two arusmyths, three lokesmyths, three goldsmyths, five fferours (shoeing smiths) and six marshalls (farriers).

The wryght wrought both in wood and metal. The number catalogued is 186, of whom 81 are called by the Latin name faber (French favre), one of the few cases in which the Latin translation of a trade name has become a common surname. The wryghts' trade, like that of the smyths, was specialized. The arkwryght made the great arks or chests in which the clothes or meal were stored, and we find a plowwryght, a wheelwryght, two shippewryghts, 11 cartwryghts and two glasswryghts (glaziers), who were probably concerned with the windows of churches. Glass windows in houses were rare, as is still

the case in Sicily cr Egypt. The bakesters are few (15), suggesting that families baked their own bread. There are 26 butchers (fleshewer, bocher or carnifex), whence Labouchere, while (43), were opulent, being taxed 12 times as much as laborers. -Notes and Que-
