## GENERAL NEWS.

The Prescott Elevator Co is taking steps to build a grain elevator in Monctreal of a million and a half bushels capacity.

The Winnipeg Liberal Association has unanimously passed a resolution approving of the tariff, especially the preferential clause.

Lord Minto and Sir Charles Tupper will attend Queens University convention on April 25 and 26. Sir Charles will inaugurate the new chair of economy and will receive the degree of L. L. D.

The city Council of Victoria, B. C. has decided to extend a formal invitation to President McKinley to visit Victoria on the occasion of his promised trip to the coast in August.

Ontario lumbermen have requested the government to impose a duty of two dollars a thousand on American pine lumber, twenty-five cents a thousand on laths and thirty cents a thousand on shingles.

The final curtain is just being rung down on the old divorce regime of North Dakota. Hundreds of divorcees are safely behind and stores have been shut out. The divorce colony of Fargo, now numbers 150, and decrees are being issued at the rate of three a day.

Another party of Doukhobors will shortly be on their way to Canada. On the seventeenth of this month a party of a thousand will sail from Cyprus on the Beaver Line Steamship Lake Superior, and it is expected that they will arrive at Quebec somewhere between the fourth and the tenth of May. It will be remembered that these Doukhobors went to Cyprus some time ago, but the climate did not agree with them, and something like five hundred died. The thousand which will shortly be on their way to Canada, are the remainder of this lot.

At St. Thomas, Ont., Mrs. Robert Goodchild, wife of the bandmaster of the Salvation Army has eloped with John Moore are gone to the United States. Both Mrs. Goodchild and Moore were members of the Salvation Army band a short time ago, but the attentions paid by Moore to Mrs. Goodchild were so marked as to cause a scandal and the couple were discharged from active service. All this has been going on for the past year, and the husband seems to have been in ignorance of what was going on until he was rudely awakened on Saturday.



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
