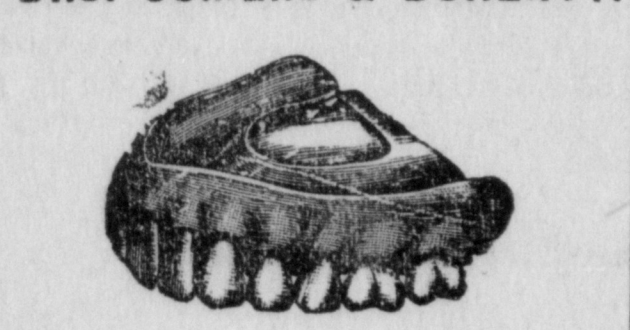

PROVINCIAL BUDGET.

HON. MR. TWEEDIE SUBMITS THE ESTIMATES.

FREDERICTON, Apr. 13.—Hon Mr. Tweedie yesterday submitted a message from his honor the lieutenant-governor transmitting estimates of the sums required for the service of the province, not otherwise provided for, for the current year; and in accordance with the provisions of the British North America act recommending such estimates to the house as follows:

BUDGET SPEECH.

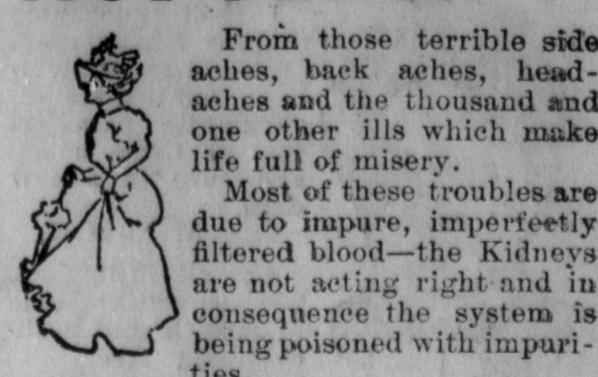
Hon. Mr. Tweedie said in his estimate of income last year he had predicted a balance over the expenditure of \$6,038.52. He regretted that that had not been verified on account of a shortage of revenue and some other expenditures which he would explain later in detail. The fact was that there had been some \$18,000 of an over expenditure. A great deal of criticism was often made upon the fact that over expenditures were made, but as he had already said it was not possible to estimate some of these items closely, and an over expenditure was no more evidence of mismanagement than an under expenditure would be.

Last year the territorial revenue had fallen short of the expectation by \$3,040.37. The fees from the provincial secretary's office which had been placed at \$10,000, only came to \$8,311.45, an adverse showing of \$1,688.55. The lunatic asylum estimate was \$7,500, whereas only \$5,610.57 was received. Agriculture had been estimated at \$4,000, but \$2,250 had been received. Private and local bills, placed at \$700 had realized \$549.99. Taxes from incorporated companies were placed at \$23,500 which was exceeded by \$1,860.47 as the receipts came to \$25,360.47. Succession duties were estimated at \$14,000, but only came to \$8,197. Receipts from the queen's printer were calculated at \$900, which was not reached by \$134.57. Liquor licenses came to \$21,425.50 as compared with an estimate of \$20,500. Miscellaneous receipts were estimated at \$3,000, but only \$848.11 were received. The total revenue for the year was \$708,809.18, while the estimate had been \$1,021.32 greater.

ESTIMATED EXPENDITURES.

Referring now to the estimated expenditures for the past year, Mr. Tweedie said that he had placed the administration of justice at \$17,850, whereas the real amount paid out proved to be \$19,804.69 an excess over estimate at \$1,954.60. The outlay upon agriculture had been \$26,138.99, as compared with the estimate of \$23,150. The Boys' Industrial Home had cost \$1,300, instead of \$1,500 estimated. Contingencies had exceeded the expenditure of \$23,000 by \$2,862.21. On education he had estimated an outlay of \$200,344.48, and the amount actually paid was \$201,012.85. Fisheries protection had cost \$1,748.31, while only \$1500 had been provided for it. Executive government had fallen short of the estimate of \$28,720 by \$1,079.66. One thousand dollars had been provided for forest fires, but the season had been a damp one and only \$450 was spent. Free grants expenditure had been placed at \$2,500, but had amounted to \$2,483.18. Interest was placed at \$123,000 but amounted to \$126,505.96. The legislature had cost \$406.90 less than the expectation, or \$20,870.60. Lunatic asylum had cost exactly what was estimated. For game protection \$2,500 was provided, but \$1,640 had been expended. For immigration \$949.17 had been expended, not placed in the estimates, but authorized by act of esse-

bly passed after the estimated had been put through. The outlay upon mining had been \$547.61, while the estimate was \$500. Public health had been placed at \$2,100, but only \$1,361.32 had been expended. Refunds, crown lands had amounted to \$261, or \$61 over the estimate. Surveys and railway inspection had cost \$2,686.60, or \$213.40 less than expected. Upon the sportsmen exhibition at Boston \$3,907.70 had been expended. No estimate had been made for that but it was authorized by the act past last winter. A revision of the statutes had cost \$1,479.48, or \$2,052 less than the estimate. Unforeseen expenses placed at \$2,000 had amounted to \$1,032.25.

The total expenditure therefore had been for the year \$727,049.75 as contrasted with the estimate of \$712,991.98, an excess of \$14,057.77.

VARYING OF ESTIMATES.

Hon. Mr. Tweedie had referred in detail to the causes which had operated to vary the estimates, taking up in turn the various items.

Criminal prosecutions under the head of administration of justice had cost \$2,917.28 or \$417.28 over the estimate. For reporting decisions of the supreme court only half the amount, or \$450 had been paid, as the reports were somewhat behind and the government had not felt justified in paying the full amount until they were finished. The amount paid out upon criminal prosecutions had been larger than expected owing to a number of important cases that had arisen in Westmorland and Carleton counties.

Jury fees had amounted to a larger sum than was paid during the last four years. In 1894 the sum was \$4,184.30; in 1895, \$7,009.40; in 1896, \$4,546.10; in 1897, \$5,412.60; while last year it was \$7,417.60. The outlay upon agriculture included \$1,000 for flour mills not estimated for last year but provided by law \$250 bonuses to cheese factories is credited as returned, the real over expenditure, therefore, on agriculture was \$2,968.99 or less these items \$1,738.99, which may be accounted for in the item of Farmers' and Dairy-men's Association. The department is also charged with \$1,000 additional salary paid to J. L. Inche, which matter was now finally disposed of.

Mr. Tweedie referred to the matter of free grants, also to the immigration question. He spoke on the Cross Creek gold region and the Baltimore shale of Albert Co. The receipts estimated for the current year were \$760,510.56. He put the total bonded debt on Oct. 31st, '99 at \$3,012,113.33.

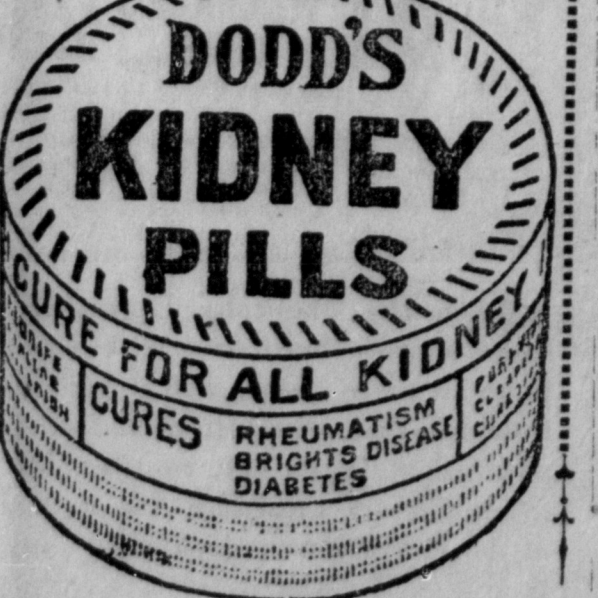
Mr. Hazen spoke for an hour and debate was adjourned.

INSURANCE FOR LITIGANTS.

LLOYDS ACCEPTS RISKS ON APPEALS TO THE HIGHER COURT.

LONDON, April 13.—The Lloyds underwriters are now doing a new form of insurance. A litigant in the Supreme Court who is an appellant or respondent in an appeal from the verdict to the Court of Appeals can insure himself against an adverse decision.

The rate of premium depends on the legal reputation of the judge whose decision is questioned, and ranges from 90 per cent. in case of a judge who was appointed solely for political services and is a bad lawyer, to 10 per cent. in the case of Lord Chief Justice Russell, who has had the smallest percentage of reversals since his appointment.

There is a fixed rate for every Supreme Court judge, based on information supplied by leading lawyers practising before them.
