—Hon. J. I. Tarte, minister of public works is a very sick man. His ailment is of the liver and he will have to undergo an operation.

—Karl M. Creelman, of Truro, N. S., is making a tour around the world on a wheel. He says he expects to make the tour in five years.

—The lobster catch is fair along the coast at some points. Last Saturday Mr. R. O'Leary's tug, Frederick A., brought about 350 boxes into town.

—Among the smaller business failures of the week is William Robinson, carriage maker, of Newcastle, N. B. He has been in the business for 38 years and did well until younger men and newer methods crowded him out.

—A black bass weighing 40 lbs was taken in a weir on Tuskent river on Sunday—the only one known to have been taken from that river for a generation past. The fish was purchased by Mr. Forman Hatfield and shipped to Boston. —Yarmouth Light.

—At Moncton Saturday the police captured a youthful burglar, a ten-year-old boy named Alfred Sandon. He was found in the city market rifling tills in various stalls. Sandon confessed to committing other thefts, but this is the most gigantic escapade he has been concerned in.

—The body of Wm. O'Brien, of Fredericton, was found in an outhouse of the Commercial Hotel in an advanced state of decomposition. He had been missing since Nov 22nd last. Foul play is suspected by some. Others believe deceased wandered there and died in a drunken and exhausted condition. An inquest will be held.

—An offer of 40 cents in the dollar, in two, four and six months, secured, is made by Chas. Schachter, general dealer, Chatham, N. B. He owes \$5,500. The chief feature of his business has been the supplying of pedlars, etc. It is thought he lost money by frequent moves. Mr. Schachter is a brother of Benie Schachter who did business here last winter.

—Joseph Maurice, a sailor from the Barque Valona, who deserted from the vessel last Thursday, was brought to jail here Tuesday by Constable Ferguson, of Harcourt. David Clark's barber shop at Harcourt was broken into Monday night and a quantity of furniture stolen. Maurice was found hidden in a barn and suspicion at once fixed itself on him. He was taken before Stipendiary Magistrate Bailey, acknowledged the charge and was accordingly committed for trial at the next County Court in July. Maurice claims to belong to Bretagne, France. He had a sack full of goods which he had evidently stolen in other places.

—The jury on the inquest on the body of Wm. McLean murdered in Stanley, York Co., brought in a verdict "That Wm. McLean came to his death by the stab of a knife."

—In our issue of May 11th we stated that all the petitions for licenses presented to the commissioners at the meeting held at Buctouche on April 29th were granted. The commissioners wish us to say that all but two were granted at that meeting, and at a meeting held at the Kent Northern Hotel, Kingston, on the 8th, inst., the other two were considered and granted.

FISH NOTES.

It is rumored that a sardine factory is to be established in connection with the lobster factory at Grand Manan, N. B. in the near future.

Two large fishery establishments have been opened at Baie Verte, N. B., under the management of Mr. Ripley, of Grand Manan, and a third at Northport, about fifteen miles down the bay, under the same control.

Sir Louis Davies has come to a presumably final decision in the matter of the length of lobsters. The ten-and-a-half-inch regulation will be abandoned, and the legal permission length will be fixed at nine inches.

Prominent among the lobster factories on Prince Edward Island that are being improved is that of John Jardine, on Crown Point, who has added 1,000 new traps, besides a 27-foot sloop-rigged boat and a large dory for hauling the tackle. He is also erecting a larger factory and will employ more fishermen.

Advices from St. John's, N. F., state that the seal fishery this year is the most successful within the last dozen years. Altogether, it is estimated that the total catch of the regular fleet will reach 300,000. Probably 40,000 or 50,000 more will be taken by the people ashore.

Mackerel catch to date: Fresh mackerel—1899, 1,041 barrels; 1898, 1,000 barrels; 1897, 10,502 barrels; salt, 470 barrels; 1896, 3,000 barrels.

The schooner Ethel B. Jacobs, Captain Solomon Jacobs, arrived at Boston on Monday afternoon from the Southern seining with 3,500 large fresh mackerel. The fish sold for 18 cents each.

Captain Solomon Jacobs has sailed in the Ethel B. Jacobs for the Cape Shore.

The schools of mackerel are working toward the eastward. The seiners are moving toward Block Island, where they expect to find plenty of fish.
