SAVED FIVE LIVES.—Gordon Heron, son of the late Major Heron, of the Inland Revenue Department, Ottawa, and grandson of the late Gordon Brown, who for many years was connected with the Toronto Globe, performed an act of heroism which entitles him to the consideration of the Humane Society. Young Heron is but fifteen years old, yet he swam out with a plank to five ladies who were drowning in Gatineau river, near Chelsea. He got them on it and ferried to the other side of the river, the current being too strong to return. Two river men were at the bank, but offered no assistance. All five ladies belonged to Ottawa.

CONSECRATION AT COCAGNE.—A unique and beautiful ceremony marked at 3.00 p. m. Sunday, the consecration of the life-size crucifix erected in the enlarged cemetery of the R. C. church at Cocagne. An immense concourse of people added impressiveness to the occasion, while eight priests assisted at the celebration. They were Revs. H. A. Meaham, Moncton, F. X. Michaud, A. LeBlanc, Buctouche, A. Oullet, St. Mary's, P. Bellevue, Grandigue, P. Dufour, Notre Dame, A. T. Bourgeois, C. S. C., St. Joseph's College, and J. A. L'Archeveque, P. P. The interior of the church was tastily festooned and the cemetery effectively decorated. After the consecration Rev. P. Bellevue pronounced a French sermon near the foot of the cross, and was followed by Rev. H. A. Meaham in English. A collection at the graveyard netted over \$100. Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament was afterwards given in the church which, though spacious, could by no means contain all the throng.

PICNIC, BAZAR AND CONCERT AT ST. LOUIS.—The annual picnic of the parish of St. Louis will be held, as in former years, on the feast of St. Anne, Wednesday, the 26th July inst. There will be High Mass at 9 o'clock, and in the afternoon a procession to the Grotto of N. D. de Lourdes, followed by the solemn benediction of the B. Sacrament, and the Veneration of a Relic of St. Anne. Tables will be abundantly served, and there will be a great variety of refreshments and amusements. A bazar will be held at the same time in the great hall of the Convent, and in the evening a Seance and Concert will be given by the old and present pupils of the Convent. The Bazar and Concert will be under the direction and patronage of the Revd. Sisters of the Cong. de N. D., and many of the leading and generous ladies of the parish and elsewhere. We cordially invite all the friends of education, and of our Convent Academy to favor us with their presence and their generous encouragement, as all the proceeds of this feast will go to help in the erection of an annex to the convent, it having become necessary, on account of the considerable increase of pupils these few years past.
