FAILURES IN NEW BRUNSWICK.—Monetary Times, Toronto: The following business casualties are reported in New Brunswick: A. J. Lordly & Sons, furniture dealers, of St. John, are offering a compromise of 25 per cent., spread over six months. Liabilities are about \$7,000 of which \$1,370 are preferred, with assets of \$4,600. McGinnis Bros., Fredericton, men's furnishings, who were reported as offering 30 cents several weeks ago, have now assigned. One partner previously worked in a sawmill and the other in a boot and shoe concern. Such was their preparation for business. Samuel Black, who has been doing peddling in and about Nelson for the past several years, is reported an absentee. D. G. Scott, who has been selling groceries at Moncton under the style of Scott & Co., his wife being the registered owner of the business, is also reported as missing. He had recently tried to settle at 50 cents, and said he had secured the money to compromise on this basis, but has since left town and the landlord is in possession of his stock.

—The sash and door factory of J. & H. Nadeau, on the Grand Caspédia River, P. Q., was destroyed by fire last Friday night.

—A man by the name of Roderick Price escaped from the insane asylum at St. John Monday afternoon while at work on the grounds.

—Schooner Maggie Roach, Capt. Weston arrived in port yesterday morning from P. E. Island with a cargo of coal for Mr. G. W. Robertson.

—Mr. Louis Hebert, who is in charge of the Kingston ferry, says he counted the number of horses that crossed the ferry last week and in all there was 996.

—The temporary bridge which is being built at Kingston is expected to be in readiness for pedestrians in about a week's time. Mr. Haines is rushing things along.

—Rev. Mr. Whiteside, of Woodstock preached in St. Andrew's Presbyterian church, Kingston, on Sunday morning and in Chalmers' Presbyterian church, Richibucto, in the evening.

—We are requested to say by Mr. J. F. Black that he has a large watch dog which he will keep on his cranberry plain and anyone taking berries from his land will have to abide with the consequences.

—The Northern Enterprise at Campbellton, has suspended publication. F. W. Brown, the proprietor, left town about a month ago. J. H. MacDonald, who has recently edited it, is not there at present.

—Messrs. J. & T. Jardine have had a small scow fitted up with boiler and engine for the purpose of towing rafts of logs in shallow water. It draws about 20 inches of water. It was out for its first trip last Friday.

—Messrs. A. & R. Loggie have had a boiler put in their building on Queen St. for the purpose of boiling blueberries, which will be canned. They expect to put up about 100 tons of blueberries and raspberries.

—In the 230 class of the trotting races held at Bathurst last Thursday, D. D. Warman's Guy J., took first money in three straight heats. Vernon River Boy owned by R. Hebert, Kingston, took second money.

—The horse race in the Kent Driving Park on Saturday afternoon is expected to be one of the greatest races ever held in Kent. Those who witnessed the horses trotting on the 12th inst., will have an idea what the race will be like.

—In the speedy trials court at Dorchester on Tuesday, Judge Wells presiding, John McDonald, who was charged with abducting Ada White, of Moncton, on the 13th of July, was elected to be tried by jury. He will come before the grand jury in the court in September.

—A special cable to the Montreal Star, from Paris says: An operation for the liver was performed upon the Hon. J. Israel Tarte this morning by Doctor Segond. The operation was very successful and Mr. Tarte is resting quietly. His speedy recovery is now expected.

—Bark Ossuna, Capt. Andrews, arrived outside the harbour on Saturday morning and was towed into port on Monday morning by tug Calluna. This is her first voyage this season. This makes eight square-rigged vessels this season. Tug Calluna has brought six of these into port.

—Burglars have again been at work in Moncton. Some time between Saturday the 15th and Tuesday the 18th the residences of Messrs. F. A. McCully and D. I. Welsh and the warehouse of the White Store were broken into, and goods to the amount of \$200 stolen. One of the burglars was caught in Chatham, but the others have not yet been captured.

—Rev. Fr. Michaud, of Buctouche, has received a cablegram from the manufacturers of the chime of bells in France, announcing that owing to some accident occurring in the firm they cannot deliver the chime of bells before the middle of September. On account of the accident the blessing of the chime of bells will not be held on the 9th of August as was announced but will be held later.
