### FILIPINO PEACE OVERTURES.

NEW YORK, April 27.—Under a Manila date the Evening Journal prints the following: The revolt of the Filipinos against the authority of the United States appears to be on the eve of collapse. Aguinaldo according to a representative of the Filipino commission here, is now conferring with the cabinet concerning peace overtures. The next advance of the American troops will bring about the absolute surrender of the rebel forces. A feeling of hopelessness is spreading throughout the insurgent army, and many of Aguinaldo's and Luna's officers are returning to work in Manila.

### DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

THE ESTIMATES FOR THE YEAR ARE SUBMITTED.

OTTAWA, April 26.—In the Federal house yesterday Mr. Fielding moved an adjournment of the debate. In doing so he said that the house could not deal with a separate item of the tariff, but must deal with the tariff as a whole, and that he did not propose to anticipate the budget speech by any discussion now.

The motion for adjournment carried by a vote of 68 to 30.

Mr. Craig, was the only Conservative who voted with the government. Messrs. Monet, Legris and Snetsinger were the only Liberals who kicked over the traces.

Mr. Ellis said he had a standing pair else he would have voted against the amendment. With the exception of these votes, the division was a straight party one.

Before the house adjourned the minister of finance informed the members that estimates would be taken up in committee to-day. They were laid on table of house. Mr. Fielding also announced that budget speech would be delivered a week from to-day. House adjourned 10.20 p. m.

### THE ESTIMATES.

The total expenditure estimated in this first draft for 1899-1900 is \$41,528,000 for current account, and \$4,758,000 for capital account.

The proposed increase in current expenditure over the current year is \$555,000. There is a nominal decrease in capital expenditure, but these accounts are usually largely deferred to the supplementary estimates.

The increase in the public debt charge is very large, namely, \$421,000, and \$270,000 additional is to be spent on the Yukon.

The civil government salaries' increase are \$19,000. In 19 cases in the civil service payments are to be made "notwithstanding anything to the contrary in the civil service act."

Mr. Fisher asks for \$80,000 instead of the previous vote of \$75,000, for experimental farms; \$40,000 instead of \$30,000 for agriculture and dairying, and puts on a new item of \$20,000 for an illustrating station. There is a decrease from \$80,000 to \$60,000 for advances for milk and cream at dairy stations, and one of from \$85,000 to \$70,000 in the cold storage appropriation.

The immigration expenditure is increased from \$358,000 to \$350,000, the addition being in "contingencies and general expenses."

### MILITIA PAY AND ALLOWANCES

are slightly increased. The annual drill is raised from \$300,000 to \$400,000; military properties, from \$131,000 to \$164,000; the Royal Military College from \$55,000 to \$70,000; the cartridge factory, from \$80,000 to \$108,000; defence of Esquimaux, from \$76,000 to \$109,000.

Monuments for the battlefields of Stoney Creek and Burlington call for \$3,000.

\$386,000 charged to capital is to be spent on artillery and fortress armament as against \$281,000 this year.

Dr. Borden provides for 12 days' drill of the entire militia.

The appropriation for militia clothing is increased from \$150,000 to \$250,000.

The railway department's proposed capital expenditure includes \$445,000 for increased accommodation at St. John; \$100,000 for strengthening iron bridges; \$20,000 for air brakes; \$5,000 for new machinery at Moncton; \$15,000 for enlargement of engine houses, and \$343,000 for rolling stock.

The total amount of the Intercolonial capital expenditure is \$941,000.

Canals—charged to capital, amounts to \$2,834,000, the largest item being for the Soulanges, Gallops, Trent and Welland canals.

The sum of \$354,000 is to be spent on the St. Lawrence ship channel.

Chargeable to income are \$13,000 for Halifax drill hall, \$15,500 for the Kentville building, \$12,000 for the Windsor building, and \$1,900 for a drill shed in that town.

New Brunswick has only the Marysville building, \$4,000.

Mr. Tarte will spend \$100,000 on public buildings at Ottawa.

### OTHER ITEMS.

The appropriations for the Queen's statue is increased from \$7,000 to \$12,000.

No changes are yet proposed in the mail subsidies.

In the lighthouse service, the salary of F. J. Harding, St. John, is increased from \$1,400 to \$1,600.

There is an apparent decrease in the salaries of fishery inspectors and overseers from \$95,000 to \$70,000.

Administration salaries in the Yukon are increased from \$75,000 to \$100,000.

The mounted police in the Yukon will cost \$500,000, or \$150,000 more than this year.

The sum of \$40,000 is to be spent in surveying all Canadian railways routes to the Klondyke.

\$38,000 worth of new plant is to be put in the printing bureau.

An additional \$15,000 will be voted for future expenses of the International convention.

The salary of the Nova Scotia post office inspector is raised to \$2,600.

A vote of two thousand dollars is asked for the widow of John Campbell, railway mail clerk, New Brunswick division who was killed in a railway accident in 1889.

OTTAWA, April 27.—The Minister of Marine stated in reply to Mr. McIsaac that the total cost of the Behring Sea arbitration to Canada was \$140,581.

Mr. Pope was informed that the Department of Justice had reported favorably upon an application for an election in the county of Brome to set aside the Scott act.

Mr. Clark was informed by Mr. Sifton that last year Canada paid to British steamship men seven shillings per head for immigrants, twelve years old or over, brought from Great Britain to Canada and half that amount for children. To agents of foreign steamship companies \$5 per head was paid for immigrants, over eighteen years of age from the continent of Europe. This was the same as the late government had paid. It was impossible to say how many immigrants had been sent to Canada by Canadian immigration agents in Great Britain and the United States.

Mr. Bostock's bill to compel railways to issue passes to members of the Senate and House of Commons came up for its second reading and was killed.

Mr. Monk moved the second reading of his bill to amend the civil service act. The bill provides that all dismissed civil servants shall be furnished with a certificate setting forth the cause of their dismissal, complaints made against them, who made them, the investigation made and the proceedings of the same.

Sir W. Laurier said that if Mr. Monk's bill were accepted our whole system of responsible government would become absolutely null. He agreed that a civil servant should have as many rights as an ordinary citizen and no more. He asked why the government should be subjected to conditions with respect to employes that no one would dare impose on a private citizen. He said the spoils system had never been introduced and he hoped it never would. He had no objections to civil servants, but he held they should not meddle in politics. In this connection he pointed out that there had been no dismissals in the inside service for offensive partizanship. He held there had been no dismissals without cause, and this could not be done on account of our system of responsible government. The bill was suitable to the United States, where the President was supreme and absolute during his term of office. Here, however, the government was responsible to the House and were liable to dismissal themselves if they could not give satisfactory reasons for any dismissal they made. He held our system of government afforded ample sufficient protection for the public interest and the civil servant, saying that if, any one applied for a certificate of character he would get it. The Premier concluded by intimating there was no reason to depart from the principal of responsible government. He moved a six months' hoist.

Sir Charles Tupper declared the present government had degraded the public service by driving out some of the best men and terrorizing others. The Premier had now made it plain how he and his colleagues had come to do the country this great wrong. They started out with the assumption that they were the masters and that the officers were their personal ser-

vants. They forgot that both ministers and officials were the servants of the people. Having introduced the spoils system into this country with all the degradation that it involved, the government was now refusing to the victims of its tyranny the opportunity to secure situations after they were turned out of the public employ. They not only deprived civil servants of their living, but also of their good name. Sir Charles declared Mr. Monk's bill was eminently reasonable and just.

After such discussion the vote was finally taken on Mr. Laurier's motion for a six months' hoist. The amendment was carried by a vote of 64 to 38; majority 25.

Stubbs and Leighton McCarthy, the only two McCarthyite members, and Rogers, the only patron member, voted against the government.

Mr. McInerney, of Kent, is making inquiry into the purchases of steel rails for the Intercolonial. He wants to know what purchases have been made without tender and what prices were paid.

Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper returned from British Columbia and took his seat in the House to-day.

The question of preferential trade will be taken up by the senate as well as the House of Commons.

A bill on the order paper in the name of Mr. McAlister, of Restigouche, asks for the incorporation of the Restigouche Boom Company, and thereby hangs a tale of some inter-provincial interest. It appears that the company holds its charter of incorporation from the Province of New Brunswick, but as it has been compelled to confine its operations to the New Brunswick side of the river, serious losses had been sustained through the floating of timber out to sea, the loss amounting it is claimed, to five per cent. of the whole supply.

As a remedy, application to the Quebec Government for incorporation was suggested, but it has now been decided to ask for incorporation from the Dominion government on the grounds that the river is a tidal water as well as being inter-provincial. It is claimed that by constructing works on either side of the lowest of the islands, logs may be diverted and safely captured without obstructing the channel.

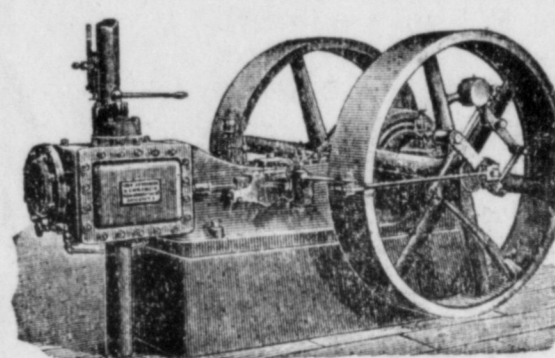

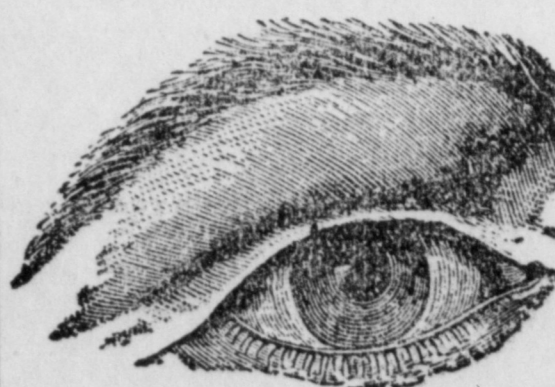

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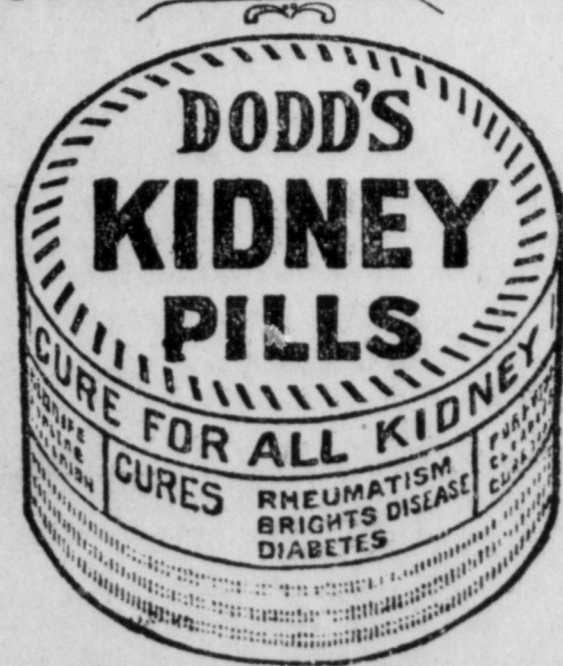
