**THE KING OF TONGA'S WOES.**  
Despatches indicate a curious tangle, matrimonial and other, in the Kingdom of Tonga. The ways of barbarism and civilization in some respects are not far apart: "King George Tohoa I had reached marriageable age and his advisors presented to him for choice two young girls, one a pretty peasant girl from Niba Island and the other Fabiana Kabu, the 12-year-old daughter of the Tonga minister of police. To the amazement of the court the king declared that he would marry both.  
Preparations for the wedding advanced auspiciously until the alarming discovery was made that the crown treasurer, Kaopai, had absconded with all the state funds, helping himself at the same time to the king's yacht in order to get away.  
While Tonga was still talking of the robbery word was received that the yacht had been wrecked on the Samoan coast and the treasurer arrested in Apia. The young German who acts as assistant to the Minister of police was sent from Tonga to bring back the delinquent, but before he reached Apia Kaopai had broken jail and taken refuge in the woods, where he has thus far evaded pursuit.  
In the meantime, the king was compelled to indefinitely defer his double wedding on account of the financial stringency, and the commercial firm most interested appealed to the German vice-consul for assistance to collect various claims against the crown and natives of Tonga. The latter cannot, by international law, contract debts, yet the vice-consul, in a series of interviews with the king, and despite the fact that Tonga is within the sphere of British influence, threatened that all private as well as public debts must be forthwith discharged or he would seize Vavau island in satisfaction and rettlement.  
The king has laid his case before the British consul.

**DOMINION PARLIAMENT.**

OTTAWA, April 28.—Sir Wilfrid, replying to Mr. Foster, said that on Monday next he would make a statement of government legislation generally.  
Mr. Blair, in answer to Mr. Foster, said that no arrangement had been made between the government and the Canadian Pacific in regard to running trains between Halifax and St. John. The matter had not yet reached a stage at which he could say an agreement was not possible.  
Owing to the absence of the leader of the opposition, the government postponed until next week the debate on the Drummond County Railway resolutions. The house then went into committee to supply.  
A vote for "contingent expenses in connection with the voters' list" caused considerable discussion. Several members of the opposition held the franchise act required that lists should be printed within a limited period after their receipt from the municipal custodians, and held that \$2,500, of course, would not be sufficient.  
Sir Louis Davies said the vote was not for the printing of all lists, but to meet special cases, such as the Brockville and Winnipeg by-elections.  
The franchise act was read by Mr. Casgrain to show that the intention was that the lists should be printed within a limited time after their receipt by the clerk of the crown in chancery. Every member of parliament, it was provided, should be furnished with a certain number of copies of the lists. Now this was not done last year and there was no vote to do it this year.  
Sir Louis Davies said that it would cost over \$60,000 and if the house decided to do this it would be done, but he did not think it was necessary.  
Sir W. Laurier claimed this an injustice in Manitoba, where there was no lists. They could not get hold of any lists or secure any idea as to what condition the lists were in.  
In connection with the discussion Mr. Wallace charged that the Conservatives had not been able to get any lists for Brockville until after nomination, while the Liberals had them before it.  
Mr. Blair said he had it upon the authority of the secretary of state that an equal number of Brockville lists had been sent to both candidates by the same mail on the same day. He said he was sure no party would treat opponents so unfairly as alleged.  
The item stood.  
The Senate has adjourned until the 17th of May.
