SAD BEREAVEMENT.—The death of Mrs. Robert Phinney which occurred on Sunday afternoon was a great shock to her numerous friends and relatives in Richibucto, Miramichi, and elsewhere throughout the Province. After spending the day in company with her mother, Mrs. Robert Loggie, of Chatham, (who was visiting her),—pleasantly with friends, she was taken suddenly ill on Monday night of last week with acute peritonitis, although, at first, no danger was apprehended and the best local medical skill was had, subsequently aided by Dr. Ferguson, of Moncton, who was called in consultation, she rapidly grew worse until she passed away on Sunday afternoon. The deceased lady has been a resident of Richibucto for a little more than three years, and during that time has made a large circle of friends in this town and vicinity who will deeply regret her early demise, while extending heartfelt sympathy to her husband and other relatives in their sad bereavement. The funeral took place on Wednesday afternoon, and was very largely attended. Services at the house and grave were conducted by Rev. D. Fraser and Rev. W. Lawson, and were deeply affecting. The floral offerings of wreaths and cut flowers were numerous and very beautiful. Interment was made in the Methodist Cemetery in this town, the body being laid alongside that of Miss Dorothy Phinney, the Red Cross Nurse, whose death while on professional duty at Tampa, Fla., we were so recently called upon to chronicle. The pall bearers were G. V. McInerney, R. O'Leary, F. Ferguson, F. S. Sayre, W. E. Forbes and Bazile E. Johnson, while relatives of the deceased from Chatham, Richibucto, Newcastle, Fredericton and Montreal walked as chief mourners. —Mr. J. C. Pankhurst, St. John, has our thanks for a copy of Haddon & Co.'s London Diary for the current year.

—On account of the heavy snow and slush on the ice smelt fishing is quite difficult, and very few fish are being caught.

—Saturday was a beautiful day and the roads were fairly good which, in part, accounts for the large vote polled all over Kent county.

—The concert which was to be held in the St. Nichol's River Hall Thursday evening has been postponed until March 15th, on account of the bad roads.

—Yesterday was Declaration Day but we cannot do more in this issue than give the official returns. We go to press too early to give any report of the speeches.

—The Stanley arrived at Georgetown, P. E. I., on Saturday afternoon after being sixteen days out in the ice. She left Georgetown for Pictou Tuesday morning, 21st inst., at six o'clock.

—It is said Hon. Edward Blake will return to Canada for good in May, possibly before. He will be tendered a farewell banquet under the auspices of all sections of the Nationalist party.

—It will be learned with regret that while driving from Albert on Saturday a piece of ice flew from the horse's hoof and injured Hon. Mr. Emmerson's right eye, which is very much inflamed. In company with Mrs. Emmerson he was driving to Hopewell Cape, where on Tuesday a demonstration was given in his honor.

—The steamer, Bruce arrived at North Sydney on Sunday from St. John's Nfld., with mails and passengers. She passed through hundreds of miles of heavy ice and reports the gulf so completely blocked that there is no chance of the new Canadian liner Gaspeian getting out for weeks. It would be impossible for a sailing steamer to reach her. The Gaspeian was caught in the ice a couple of weeks ago.

—One incident of the election in Westmorland is worth relating. An Opposition canvasser gave an elector an order for a barrel of flour and 2 bottles of whiskey for his vote. He gave the order and the ticket to the elector together and the latter mistaking one for the other deposited the order in the ballot box, with the result that the elector lost his bribe and the Opposition ticket were minus one vote.

—The death occurred at Fredericton on Sunday night of David Thompson, a well known wheelwright, followed two hours later by his wife. Mr. Thompson was seventy-three years and his wife sixty-nine. They were married thirty-two years ago, and have since lived continuously in the house in which they died. They leave one son, Alfred, of Lynn, Mass., and four daughters, Mrs. D. H. Melvin, St. John; Mrs. J. D. McNeill, Chatham; Mrs. John Martin, Bangor, and Miss Alice Thompson, of Fredericton.

—About two years ago two well-known young Ottawans were engaged to be married, but suddenly the match was broken off. Considerable talk resulted, but no reconciliation has since taken place. The young lady is to be married shortly, but her former suitor intends having certain matters settled before the match comes off. The first suitor when engaged to the young lady gave her about \$150 to keep as a basis for their housekeeping expenses and the nucleus of their fortune. When the match was broken off the lady kept the cash. The young man says she has since apparently found sufficient consolation for the breaking off of the match, and he intends taking steps to secure the return of his \$150. He will, if necessary, institute legal proceedings, and will take steps at once.
