LETTER FROM MR. GORDON LIVINGSTON.

To the Editor of the Globe: Sir,—I am not troubled with "cacothetiscribendi." It may please the Richibucto correspondent of the Daily Sun of St. John to write what he pleases of Kent county politics.

I know whereof I write, and may be permitted to make a few remarks on the approaching contest.

The Sun's correspondent from the shiretown must be writing for a twofold purpose, to wit: (1) amusement and (2) deception. While he may amuse himself, he is deceiving the people.

Now for facts which will be endorsed by the electorate of Kent county.

1. A better and more competent representative than James Barnes this county has not had during the past decade, and Mr. Barnes has been ably assisted by his colleagues, Urbain Johnson and Pierre H. Leger.

2. The expenditures on the roads and bridges during the regime of these men have not been extra lavish, and yet judicious, and every dollar will be shown to have been expended in the interest of economy and the public.

3. That it is simply untrue and furthermore it is a libel that the present representatives, Johnson, Barnes and Leger, have lost the confidence of their constituents.

4. That the voice of the electorate—excepting the "ring" run by the little coterie in the town of Richibucto—is for the return of the present M. P. P.'s.

Personally, Mr. Editor, I have no axe to grind. I expect nothing in the way of office or emolument from the Provincial government, from the Federal government or from any party or government. But I expect, believe and am convinced (notwithstanding all correspondence and telegrams to the contrary) that the county of Kent will re-elect Messrs. Urbain Johnson, James Barnes and Pierre H. Leger to represent them at Fredericton during the term of the approaching Legislature's existence.

Of the majorities and minorities in the present contest I will not give the figures. A surprise awaits some and many. That surprise may be news to political traitors, backbiters, double-shufflers, Judas Iscariots and others of that ilk; and these will not be found among the followers of good, honest government as existing to-day in New Brunswick and as led by Hon. Henry R. Emmerson.
