THE GOVER TRIAL.

CLOSING INCIDENTS IN A SOMEWHAT UN-USUAL CASE.

FREDERICTON, June 27 .- On being asked if he had any objection why sentence should not be passed, Mr. Gregory briefly addressed the court in the prisoner's behalt. He said he had visited the prisoner's wife shortly after the tragedy and had found her in a depressed state of mind. She looked upon herself as having been the chief means of placing her husband in the position he now occupied, and said that she had sent many messages expressing the hope that her husband would forgive her, and hope he would soon be restored to his family.
