OUR OTTAWA LETTER.

OTTAWA, Aug. 11.—The Conservative newspapers have dubbed the session which closed to-day "the sixty million session"; but a more fitting term would be "the dirty session." In the history of our Canadian Parliament there has been nothing like the session of 1899. No other session has been characterized by such acrimony, bad temper, undignified conduct, disrespect for authority and sinful waste of time and money. It began bad and ended bad. From start to finish the Conservatives have been in the ugliest possible mood, and their aim seems to have been to make Parliament such a disagreeable place that the better class of members would prefer not to return to it. No one could take up the official debates, representing two immense volumes, without asking why there had been this terrible deluge of words on the part of men who claim to be representing a great political party in the country. What occupied five months of time could have been better done in two months, and if the Opposition have any sense of shame in their composition they will not be able to look back with any degree of satisfaction upon the showing which they made during the session now over.

The wrangling was kept up to the very closing hours of the session. On Wednesday a little incident occurred which is illustrative of the fine conception of dignity which the Conservatives have displayed on every possible occasion. Mr. McMullen happened to visit Mr. Cochrane, the Conservative member for Northumberland, with some items which had appeared respecting him in the Auditor General's Report, when the latter flew into a furious temper and said: "I cannot say it is a lie; but I will tell the honorable gentleman that if he will say anything like that to me outside the door I will slap his chops for him." Then, shaking his fist at McMullen he shouted: "Just you mention this to me tomorrow and I will smash your nose for you. You are a lying skunk." In commenting on this incident the Ottawa Conservative organ said, that while Mr. Cochrane's language might not have been Parliamentary it was picturesquely descriptive. Thus it will be seen that even the newspapers on the Opposition side have become insensible to the degradation which has been brought upon our Parliament.

Mr. Foster has never threatened to thrash anybody during the session, although it is probable that he could do so if he tried; but he is responsible in a large measure for the low tone which has marked the debates during the past five months. From the opening day to the closing he has made himself studiously offensive to members on the other side of the House, and his sneers and insinuations have been most irritating. It has come to be a by-word in Parliament that whenever the Minister of Railways has any business on hand Mr. Foster may be expected to be in his ugliest and most exasperating mood. He has certainly never lost an opportunity of saying all the nasty and contemptible things that his mind could conjure up to provoke Mr. Blair. He may have

thought this to be a clever and proper thing to do; but no one of judgment could think that he has thereby either helped or hurt a case, the cause of his party or the dignity of Parliament. For the most part the Minister of Railways has treated him with contempt, and the other day when Mr. Blair threatened to walk out of the Chamber in order to show how thoroughly he despised the offensive nagging of the member for York the Conservative papers seized upon the incident to make it appear that he had got into a furious passion. It would have suited Mr. Foster very well to have provoked the Minister into anger; but Mr. Blair knows too well that another and a better place of reckoning is open to him.

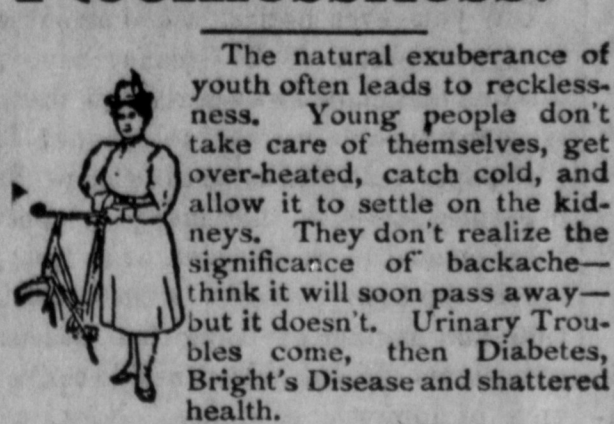
An incident which occurred the other day shows what is sticking in Mr. Foster's crop. In connection with the building of public works of New Brunswick Mr. Foster found the opportunity to ask: "Perhaps the Minister of Railways will say what constituency he intends to run for at the next election?" Mr. Blair looked at him a moment and replied: "I will be able to answer that question better when I know what constituency the honorable gentleman intends to contest." There can be no doubt that it is the sense of his impending defeat in New Brunswick which has made Mr. Foster so ugly and offensive to the Minister of Railways during the past session. Ever since the Local elections of February last he has never lost an opportunity of trying to wound and insult the Cabinet representative from New Brunswick, all of which will scarcely be of much satisfaction to him in the hour of his defeat.

To discover the purely judicial frame of mind in which Conservative Senators discuss measures brought before them, it would only have been necessary to spend a few hours in the Upper House during the past week. A stranger might well have supposed that he was listening to a political harangue during the excitement of an election campaign. He would certainly not have realized that he was in the presence of a body of men appointed for life to sit in calm and serene judgment on the legislation of the Commons, freed from party bias and acting just as a bench of judges would do. Defenders of the Senate have always advanced the argument that such a House, absolutely irresponsible, would be moved by a lofty impulse to check "hasty legislation"; but it would be a sheer waste of time to look for any such spirit in the present Upper Chamber. Than the Tory Senators it would be a difficult thing to find a more fiery set of partisans in the entire Dominion. They have been talking campaign matter during the whole session, and most of these Tories will go home with the comforting sense of having done all that was possible to help in the disreputable warfare which their confreres have carried on in the Commons.

The struggle for the Conservative leadership has now reached an acute stage. There has been for some time a hope in the hearts of many prominent men in the party that Hugh John Macdonald could be induced to take the helm, and it is said that Sir Charles Tupper favours this plan; but it is well known that Hugh John has a great aversion for Ottawa and will not under any circumstances consent to put himself in the hands of the present Parliamentary contingent. The man who is really determined to have the leadership is Mr. Clarke Wallace, and if he should succeed in his ambition it would show to what a pitiable level the once great Conservative party had fallen. There is not a Liberal in Parliament who does not regard Mr. Wallace as representing a type of politicians of the most undesirable sort. His methods are low, cunning and undignified; but he is not without a certain order of ability which finds its chief exercise in forming combinations. He is now at the head of a coterie of six or seven members who have practically been running the House for several months past, although it is only fair to say that this clique does not embrace any of the better class of men on the Conservative side. Sir Charles Tupper is now 78 years of age and the wear and tear of Parliamentary work is more perhaps than he would care to carry for another session. Mr. Foster is an impossible leader, and just now it looks as if Mr. Clarke Wallace would win.

The West Huron election case before the Privileges and Elections Committee has been rather a fizzle. At first it looked very much as if at one of the polling booths there had been some tampering with the ballots; but as the inquiry has proceeded this suspicion has disappeared from the minds of all but those who started in with fixed prejudices. A great deal of hearsay evidence has been produced; but there has been nothing in the shape of proof on this point. One thing is certain, that if there was any crooked work at one of the booths it had no appreciable effect on the result and did not in any way involve the Liberal candidate. There has not been a word of testimony to throw the slightest reproach upon Mr. Holmes. Of course, it is only natural that the Conservative newspapers should publish but one side of the story, often garbled and exaggerated, and should make the most of it; but those who desire to reach an honest judgment on the subject would do well to read the official evidence. In nearly every contest there will be somebody who will disregard the strict letter of the law, no matter how earnest
