—The Dominion Parliament is called to meet on the 16th inst.

—Rev. Dr. Brigstocke, of St. John, died Friday of inflammation of the lungs.

—On Monday open water could be seen up to the bar, and no drift ice was visible.

—Doctors report a good deal of sickness, chiefly La grippe throughout the country.

—The Harcourt mail had not reached town, Wednesday at 1 o'clock, when we go to press.

—The Kent March circuit court will meet in the Court house here next Tuesday, 14th inst, His Honor Judge Landry presiding.

—A heavy storm of thunder and lightning visited this section Sunday night. Heavy rain fell and the air was quite mild. As a result the snow is considerably settled.

—Rev. Mr. Lucas wishes to say, he regrets being hindered by storm, holding Richibucto and Welford Parish S. S. Conventions and will give due notice of his next coming.

—The wildest storm of the season visited this section Tuesday afternoon and evening, accompanied by a gale of Northeast wind. Only a small quantity of snow fell, but it is piled high in places.

—Mr. B. Schachter has decided to remain in town for a short time only to dispose of his large stock of dry goods. He is offering bargains, such as has never before been given here. See his advt.

—Captain Florence Anderson and Lieutenant Wright, of S. A., will by special request, be at Nicholas River, Pine Ridge this week, and will hold a few services at West Branch next week, beginning Monday, 7 p. m.

—At the 3rd quarterly meeting of Richibucto Circuit held March 2nd, Rev. Wm. Lawson received a unanimous invitation to remain a fourth year subject to the approval of the stationery committee of N. B. and P. E. Island conference, which was accepted.

—On Friday Dr. Bourque was summoned to Kouchibouguac to attend a son of Mr. Matthew Clark, who received a very severe cut on the foot. The young man's great toe was split in twain and the cut extended up the foot for some distance. About the same time Mr. Joseph Haines, of this town cut his foot very badly.

—At a government meeting held at Fredericton, February 28, it was decided to call the legislative assembly together for the transaction of business on March 23rd. It is generally thought that the session will be brief, and as all bills have to be ready on the opening day, there will be no unnecessary delay about getting to work. The house will rise not later than May 1st.

—Cordelia Viau, and Sam Parslow will be hanged on Friday, Lord Minto declining to interfere with the death sentence. The crime of which they were found guilty was the murder of the woman's husband near Ste. Scholastique, Quebec. This will be the first execution of a woman in Canada since the hanging of Phoebe Campbell at London in the early seventies for the murder of her husband.

—The British cruiser Talbot arrived at New York Monday from Bermuda. The Talbot was ordered there by the British government to transport the body of Lord Herschell to England. Secy. Alger has given orders that fort Wadsworth at the entrance of New York harbor, shall fire a salute of 17 guns when the British cruiser Talbot passes out of the harbor with the remains of the late Lord Herschell.

DEATH OF J. G. JOHNSON.

FUNERAL PROCESSION ONE OF LARGEST EVER SEEN IN LIVERMORE FALLS.

(Express & Advertiser, Livermore Falls) The death of Mr. J. G. Johnson, brief notice of which appeared in these columns last week, caused a cloud of sadness to hang over this community, for the deceased was a well and favorably known young man of this village, honored for his sterling qualities and his active labors for good in connection with everything in which he was interested.

Deceased was a member of the St. John the Baptist, the Red Men, the Knights of Columbus and the Foresters, holding prominent offices in each organization. Here he will be greatly missed. The members of these several organizations showing their deep respect for him, by turning out in unusually large numbers to attend the funeral services held Wednesday at the St. Rose of Lima church, Rev. N. J. Horan, pastor, Chisholm. The procession was one of the largest seen for years on the streets of our village. It was a rainy day but rising one hundred and forty members of the secret orders alone, were in the procession. Wm. Brittain, line marshal.

The floral tributes from each of the orders, and those of individual friends were beautiful and expensive.

Those who met Mr. Johnson in a business way, were all his friends as he was one to win their respect by his pleasant and quiet manners, and honorable business dealings.

Mr. Johnson died of Bright's disease, not of consumption as reported.

[Mr. Johnson was a native of St. Louis, Kent County, and was well-known in Richibucto, having spent three years in the employ of Mr. J. C. Vautour, and about one year with the late Henry O'Leary.]

BURGLARY AT CALHOUN'S MILLS.

The general store of Mr. T. B. Calhoun, at Calhoun's Mills was burglarized last Monday night and besides some clothing stolen a small sum of money was extracted from the till. Last night about ten o'clock a man giving the name of Wm. Burke was apprehended at Shediac by Deputy Sheriff Sweeney on a warrant issued by Justice E. R. McDonald. The prisoner is charged with burglarizing Mr. Calhoun's store between the hours of 5.30 Monday night and six o'clock Tuesday morning. When searched the prisoner had the sum of \$1.20 on his person, exactly the amount which was stolen from the till. He also had on three vests, two coats and two pairs of pants. Justice McDonald remanded the prisoner until ten o'clock Wednesday morning when the preliminary examination will be held. The prisoner, who calls himself Burke, is about 30 years of age and has several aliases. He hails from Buctouche and has gone by the name LeBlanc, Doiron and Gould.
