A PNEUMONIA SPECIFIC.
BERLIN, March 2—Prof. Wasserman, one of Prof. Koch's ablest pupils, is believed to have discovered a new serum for the cure of pneumonia. He inoculated rabbits with the pneumococcus bacillus which is generally believed to cause pneumonia, and with the serum thus gained he inoculated mice suffering from pneumonia.

A subsequent series of experience showed that it was in the red marrow of the bones the anti-toxine is produced and that red marrow taken from a human corpse after death from pneumonia and used as a serum will cure mice infected with that disease. Accordingly it is hoped that this serum will have the same satisfactory results in human beings.

BROKEN UP ENGLISH.

A SPEECH MADE IN OPEN COURT AT BARISAL.

The following report of a speech actually made before a magistrate in open court at Barisal recently, which is reported in the English press, will give a pretty good idea of what the English language can be made to say:

"My learned friend with mere wind from a teapot thinks to browbeat me from my legs. But this is mere gorilla warfare. I stand under the shoes of my client, and only seek to place my bone of contention clearly in your honour's eye. "My learned friend vainly runs amuck upon the sheet anchors of my case. Your honour will be pleased enough to observe that my client is a widow—a poor chap with one post mortem son.

"A widow of this country, your honour will be pleased enough to observe, is not like a widow of your honour's country. A widow of this country is not able to eat more than one meal a day, or to wear clean clothes, or to look after a man. So my poor client has not such physic of mind as to be able to assault the lusty complainant. Yet she has been deprived of some of her more valuable leather—the leather of her nose.

"My learned friend has thrown only an argument ad hominem upon my teeth that my client's witnesses are all her own relations. But they are not near relations. Their relationship is only homeopathic. So the misty arguments of my learned friend will not hold water. At least they will not hold good water. Then my learned friend has said that there is on the side of his client a respectable witness—namely, a pleader—and, since this witness is independent, so he should be believed. But your honour, with your honour's vast experience, is pleased enough to observe that truthfulness is not so plentiful as blackberries in this country.

"Ann I am sorry to say, though this witness is a man of my own feathers, that there are in my profession black sheep of every complexion, and some of them do not always speak gospel truth.

"Until the witness explains what has become of my client's nose leather he cannot be believed. He cannot be allowed to raise a castle in the air by beating upon a bush. So, trusting in that administration of British justice on which his nose never sets, I close my case."

GENERAL NEWS.

Six Mormon elders are in Winnipeg endeavoring to make converts.

Earl Rosebery has been elected president of the Eighty club in succession to Mr. Gladstone.

Advices reaching Edmonton state that fur animals are scarce around Chippewa and Indians are starving.

Sir Charles Tupper is in Hamilton, Ont., consulting leading conservatives with a view to reorganization of the party.

Montreal customs receipts for February show an increase of \$35,323, the figures being:—1898, \$668,315, and 1899, \$713,639.

H. Maitland Kersey, well known in amateur sporting circles in United States and Canada, is in Montreal on his way to the Klondike.

G. A. Caulson, a Brockville, Ont., commercial traveller fell between moving cars at London, Ont., Wednesday and had a remarkable escape from death.

There is a naval scandal at Sebastopol in connection with fuel supplied to Russian war ships. Fifty officers are to be court-martialled and 300 witnesses have been summoned.

Representatives of shipyards on the great lakes are making a deal to consolidate all shipyard interests which will put an end to the competition in vessel building on the lakes.

M. Coulombe aged 35, a shoemaker of St. Tite, Que., created a panic in the Catholic church at that place on Sunday by driving out the choir with a horse-whip and starting in to do the singing himself.

There is a movement at St. John's, Nfld., for an extensive reciprocity scheme between Newfoundland and the United States, including fish for the West Indies' market, lumber, pulp, minerals, and other products.

Burglaries are very frequent in Toronto, and on Monday there was an instance of a daylight robbery when two men entered the store of Henry Aspdon 216 Victoria street, and demanded the money. Aspdon and his daughter fought off the robbers who finally took flight.

The Ottawa Board of Trade on Tuesday evening passed resolutions urging the government to vigorously prosecute the fast Atlantic line project congratulating Mr. James Huddart on success of Canada—Australia line and recommending him to favorable consideration of the government in any regulations for a fast Atlantic service.

Frank Casazza, 38 years of age was found dead in a huge cask of wine in the Buffalo, N. Y. macaroni and vermicelli works on Monday morning. Whether he accidentally fell into the cask or had let himself in to examine its contents will never be known. Death must have been due to suffocation from the alcoholic fumes.

Commissioner Herchmer, of the Mounted Police, who is in Winnipeg on his way to Ottawa, says several able-bodied men are required on the force owing to the recent drains on the strength caused by the departure of men for the Yukon. He says that around Maple Creek many cattle have been troubled with mange, something that is rare in the North West. These cattle were in every instance importations from Ontario.

Dawson paid into the treasury of the Yukon Council from September 12 to December 31, 1898, some \$38,000. The largest sum came from the liquor permits which were issued to the extent of \$23,000. The amount of fines imposed in Dawson police courts and paid in cash was \$15,000. Marriage license fees amounted to \$26. Most of the money was paid out to Dawson hospitals for the care of poverty stricken miners. The Good Samaritan Hospital got \$12,000, the St. Mary's Hospital \$14,000, the Grand Forks Hospital \$2000.

The Toronto Mail and Empire says: Dr. Montzambert returned last week from Halifax, full of many interesting stories of his experiences with the Doukhobars. Dr. Montzambert's appointment by the Dominion Government as Director-General of Public Health has made congratulations the order of the day, though unfortunately, it means that a very popular family will remove from our midst. Dr. and Mrs. Montzambert have decided to rent their house in St. George street, and after spending the summer at their lovely Cacouna home, will go to Ottawa in the autumn.

THE NEW I. C. R. WORKS AT ST. JOHN

TO BE COMPLETED BY OCTOBER 31ST OF THIS YEAR.

St. John, March 1.—The plans and specifications of the new elevator, which have arrived from Moncton and are on view in the station-master's office at the Union depot are attracting much attention from local contractors and it is probable that a large number of tenders will be put in. It will be located on the property adjoining the Union depot known generally as the Harris property. The elevator will be 94 x 137 feet 6 inches in size, with a total height above the foundation of 155 feet 7 inches. The chimney will be 156 feet in height, while the dimensions of the power house will be 44 x 45. From the elevator to the Long wharf connection will be made by shipping conveyors of a total length of 1754 ft 6 inches.

The elevator building is to be built of yellow pine and Canadian red and white pine. The fittings are to be the same as those in the C. P. R. elevators at Sand Point. It will have a capacity of 500,000 bushels.

The big building is to be fitted throughout with electric bells, speaking tubes etc., and will be first class in every particular.

The contractor is bound to have the elevators and conveyors completed and ready for use by October 31st, 1899.

Tenders are also asked for the erection of a freight warehouse on the new I. C. R. wharf to be 148,504 feet in size.

STEAMER WRECKED.

St. John, March 2.—A despatch received last evening by S. Schofield & Co., agents of the Dominion line, announced the loss of the west coast of Scotland of mail steamer Labrador, Capt. Erskine, which sailed from St. John Feb. 9th, for Liverpool via Halifax. The ship went ashore at 7 o'clock yesterday morning on Skerryrock, which is about twelve miles southwest of Tiree Island. The crew and passengers were saved, but the vessel according to last advices, will be a total loss. The Labrador is a steel steamer of 9998 tons net register and hails from Liverpool. She is owned by the Mississippi and Dominion Steamship Co., Ltd. She is 410 feet long and holds the Canadian record for the westward passage from Liverpool to Halifax, seven and a half days. F. Agoncillo, the agents of the Philippine Junta, was among the passengers. The balance of the cargo taken from this port was \$130,549.

HALIFAX, March 1.—Pickford & Black have received a cable stating that the steamer Beta is ashore in Salt River, Jamaica. The Beta had landed all her Halifax cargo at Bermuda, Turk's Island and Kingston, and had gone to Salt River for a return cargo. Salt River is about thirty miles from Kingston, where there are a number of coral reefs.

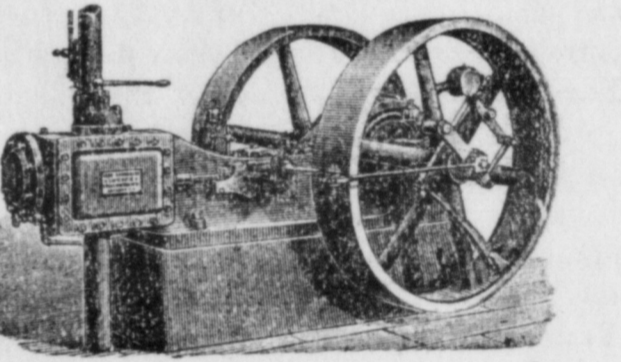
