VANCOUVER, B. C., March 14.—News of a shocking tragedy has been received from Fernie. At Hosmer, eight miles from Fernie, Benj. Moore and J. A. Lewis, accompanied by two others, left Fernie to walk twelve miles to a logging camp to get out ties for the Canadian Pacific Railway. When they arrived at a vacant logging camp, eight miles on the journey, Moore and Lewis went in to rest and the others went on. The two in the cabin lit a fire on the floor and lay down to rest. Lewis awoke with a start almost suffocated with smoke. The cabin had caught fire. Lewis rushed to the door and threw it open. Then he tried to rescue Moore, but was almost overcome by smoke and fell unconscious on the ground outside, while the cabin burned up with Moore sleeping the sleep that knows no waking. His death must have been painless.

—Dr. R. P. Doherty, of Somers & Doherty, dentists, will not be in Kent County this month.

—Geo. V. McInerney, M. P., will deliver a lecture at Brockville, Ont., tomorrow, St. Patrick's Day.

—Rev. Father Bannon is holding the Easter mission in St. Aloysius church. Rev. Father Hudson is assisting.

—Mr. Shewen, the Government engineer, was here this week and made arrangements to begin work on the breakwater at once.

—At Buctouche on Tuesday last, before Judge of Probate James, the will of Samuel B. Girouard was probated. The estate is valued at \$920.32. E. Girouard, proctor. Executors, Thos. E. Allaine and Magloire A. Girouard.

—The Times, London, says the Government will probably appoint Baron Russell, of Killowen, Lord Chief Justice of England, to succeed the late Baron Herschell on the Joint High Commission and Anglo-Venezuelan Commission.

—Mr. L. Cyriaque Daigle, Dairy Instructor for the Local Government has about forty pupils under instruction at Sussex. They comprise young men from the three Maritime Provinces. Mr. Daigle is very popular with his pupils and highly appreciated by the public.

—Rudyard Kipling, it is reported, will be elevated to the peerage on Jan. 1, 1900. Dr. Neil MacPhatter, of Edinburgh, Scot., who is staying at the Windsor Hotel, in New York, says he has received the news from Sir Walter Besant. He adds that the report is common gossip in the literary circles of London.

—The greatest sensation in the tea trade is caused by the fact that Union Blend is now being put on the market in four different grades to be sold at 25, 30, 35 and 40c. per pound, and under a patent right. A key is placed in every pound package by which the purchaser has the chance of opening a box containing a large sum of money and receiving the entire contents free. Full particulars of the scheme are in a printed form contained in every pound package.

—It is rumored that Mr. George Robertson, of St. John, will be selected as the mover of the address in the Legislature this session. Hon. Mr. Emmerson, who was in the City Friday, was interviewed regarding it. He said he did not know definitely, but Mr. Robertson was among the possible ones, being a new member. Asked about the Speakership the premier replied that he knew nothing at present of any contemplated change in this important office.

—"Talk about eggs," said the Dominion Statistician, "I have just been looking into the question of the hen as revenue producer. I find that there are about 14,000,000 hens in Canada. They yield about 80,000,000 dozen eggs a year. At twelve cents a dozen the value is close on \$9,600,000. The revenue derived by the Federal Government from taxation of spirits and wines, beer, malt and malt liquor is \$1,400,000 less than the hen fruit. The yearly expenditure of education in Canada is \$1,300,000 less than the value of the product of our noble hens."

—Mr. Wm. Smallwood aged 82 years died Sunday night at the residence of his son Silas at Harcourt. Deceased was a native of Newcastle and has been living at Harcourt since last fall. He leaves a widow and family of ten children, 5 sons and 5 daughters. The sons are Leonard and Cameron of Newcastle, Silas, of Harcourt, Jas. of Brainerd, Minnesota, Wm. F. I. C. R. locomotive engineer. The daughters are Mr. D. Petrie and Mrs. Wm. Russell of Newcastle; Mrs. R. Durbar, of Chatham; Mrs. C. Scott, of Sackville and Mrs. Wm. Buchanan, of this city. The remains will be taken to Newcastle for interment.

—A writer in the Canadian Freeman (Catholic) calls the refusal of the late conservative cabinet to pay for the wreaths "of affection" for the late Sir John Thompson an outrage on the memory of the deceased premier, and remarks that Catholics of Canada cannot afford to have a debt of this character unpaid, but should pay it and put "Messrs. Bowell, Foster et al. to the blush of shame for their unparalleled act of meanness." The writer encloses his cheque for \$10 and calls on fellow-Catholics to do likewise, and not allow an unpaid bill to remain on the tomb of the man who in life was an ornament to both church and state. The Freeman says it will acknowledge contributions.
