DEATH OF MR. JOHN GRAHAM.—Mr. John Graham, one of the oldest residents of Kouchibouguac, died at his home on Thursday 20th inst., after a brief illness. Mr. Graham was born in the north of Ireland 85 years ago and came to Miramichi with his parents when only 12 years old. He married Miss Mary Bell, of Kouchibouguac, by whom he had 19 children. Subsequently after the death of his wife he married Miss Legoo by whom he had one child, making in all 20 children, 17 of whom are living. Mr. Graham carried on extensive lumber operations and farming during his sixty-five years residence at Kouchibouguac. He never had a serious illness until his death. Even the past winter he had hauled a large number of logs. The funeral which took place Sunday afternoon was very largely attended. A large number of children and grand children being present. The funeral services at the house and grave were conducted by Mr. Robinson. The pallbearers were Messrs. Geo. W. Raymond, Joseph Grogan, Allan Carter, Joseph McMaster, John Beattie and Henry Wood.

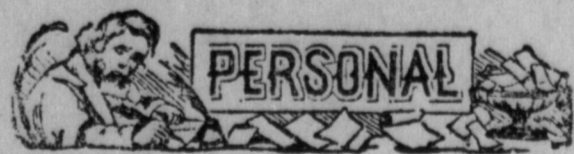

AN OCEAN TRAGEDY.

BOAT PICKED UP CONTAINING NINE CORPSES.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., April 22.—The steamer City of Paris, from Central American ports, brings details of an ocean tragedy. While the vessel was at Corinto an open boat containing the remains of nine men, who perished months ago, drifted ashore there. The bodies were horribly emaciated, and the manner in which their limbs were contracted showed that they must have died in terrible agony. Not a drop of water and not a particle of food was in the boat. In December last Louis W. Maslen, of the El Triunfo Pier Co., three of the post officials and five boatmen were out to the mail company's steamer lying in the offing at El Triunfo. They boarded the mail boat and stayed until signs of an approaching storm warned them to return. The gale came up quickly and overtook the boat soon after it got away from the steamer. It was never seen again until it floated into Corinto harbor. Louis W. Maslen was the son of E. W. Maslen, deputy naval officer of this port. The names of the other victims are not given.

The following amounts have been voted for harbors and rivers in New Brunswick:—Bouctouche—Repairs to wharf, \$1,000. Burnt Church—Wharf, \$8,000. Campbellton—Repairs to Ballast wharf, \$750. Chatham—Reconstruction and repairs to Custom House wharf, \$6,000. Clifton breakwater—Creasted block, stone tallus and repairs, \$9,500. Cocagne—Repairs to wharf \$1,500. Dalhousie—Repairs to Ballast wharf, \$2,500. Main River Bridge—Wharf, \$1,200. Richibucto—Pier repairs, \$4,000. River St. John—Including tributaries, \$16,000. River St. John—Dredging between river and Grand Lake, \$1,500. St. John harbor—Hydrographic survey, \$500. St. John harbor—Repairs to and extension of protection works at base of Fort Dufferin, \$800. Shipigan harbor—Extension and repairs to protection work \$2,400. Total for New Brunswick, \$59,750.

Dear Fellow-Workers:

Permit us to call your attention to several important matters.

1. Some of the parishes have not held their Convention. Will their parish presidents please arrange for them at once, as the busy part of the year hastens toward us.

2. Let each parish secretary please fill Reports of such Conventions when held and send a copy of each to the undersigned and to Rev. A. Lucas, Sussex.

3. I have sent to parish Secretaries forms for every school—40—in the county, that is where I knew their names, and to parish presidents where I did not; I have asked their return to me by the 21st June, next. If any do not receive them let them apply at once to me and I will send them first post.

4. Fill every column please of forms, above all do not omit name of parish secretary who should sign said report if complete.

5. Kindly spare no pains to get the Secretary of each school to report them in some way no matter what state they are in; or if defunct state the reason why, and call for help of County officers to re-organize.

6. Please take care not to confuse the the provincial S. S. fund with any denominational S. S. fund, as was done last year with great loss to the Association. Take collections, and fill up offering cards at once and send to Treasurer H. A. White, Sussex, N. B.

7. Note I am sending forms early in the suggestion of the "International Sunday School Field Association," who declare universal difficulty in getting reports ready for the various Conventions.

8. Will all Superintendents of schools not "evergreen" re-open as early as possible and write and tell County Secretary so? Parish Presidents may render valuable assistance in this matter!
