MARITIME PROVINCE NEWS.

The telephone and electric light wires in town were broken down in several places by the snow and wind of Monday's storm. At the eastern end of the town the poles were blown across the street, blocking it completely for some time.—Bridgetown Monitor.

On Saturday at Summerville, Hants Co., a neighbor calling at the residence of the widow of the late Jeremiah Bancroft, found her dead in her chair. She lived alone, and was last seen alive on Thursday morning. It is supposed she died on Thursday.—Hantsport Advance.

The anti liquor crusade has again set in at Kentville. Sometime ago there was a compromise made the crusaders agreeing not to prosecute the liquor sellers if they would sell only to guests. This pledge was given, but was not kept faithfully hence the renewal of the crusade.—Hants Journal.

A plump partridge was found lying on the ground in front of the Grand Central Hotel last Friday. The bird must have been killed by flying against the telephone wires; it was quite warm when discovered. It carried a woman's hair, some three feet in length held fast in its beak.—Bridgetown Monitor.

Thirty-seven schooners, employing over 700 men have already fitted out and sailed for the Banks this season from Lunenburg. Other schooners are being got ready as rapidly as possible, new ones are being launched every week, and business in this line appears to hum in this wide-awake Gloucester of Nova Scotia.—Yarmouth Herald.

Two thousand five hundred tons of rails have been bought from the Pennsylvania Steel Company, for the Coast Railway Co., to be delivered on or before June 1st; and a contract has been made with Mr. E. K. Spinney of this town for all the rail fittings, angle-bars, bolts, spikes, etc., with delivery on or before June 1st.—Yarmouth News.

As two colored men left a house and passed Hamilton's Pond at Three Mile Plains, on the 11th instant, they noticed the body of a child and for some reason did not make it known until the 17th inst., when Dr. Reid was notified, and on Tuesday proceeded to hold a Coroner's inquest. The Hamilton, Ont., assizes opened on Monday. The principal case is a charge of murder preferred against Ben Parrot for killing his mother.
The Grand Trunk authorities at Toronto say they have filled the places of the freight handlers who went out on strike for higher wages.
Messrs. Crossley and Hunter, the evangelists, have been working in St. Johns, Newfoundland, recently. Eighteen hundred people have professed conversion.
The Canadian Pacific railroad roundhouse at Fort William was destroyed by fire Monday night. Several new locomotives were ruined. Loss about \$80,000.
Hon. T. Nosse, Japanese consul at Chicago is in Ottawa on business with the Government. He hopes to have the British Columbia Japanese exclusion act disallowed.
A freight train on the Ottawa and Parry Sound Railway tumbled down an embankment at Canoe Lake owing to a washout, and J. McLaren, a fireman, was killed. The engineer was badly hurt.
