OTTAWA LETTER.

OTTAWA, 25th May.—Her Majesty's loyal Opposition sustained another knock-out during the past week, when the trade returns for the ten months ending 30th April were brought down. The official figures showed an improvement over the corresponding period of last year of \$42,875,453. The exports amounted to \$148,355,451 and the imports to \$149,598,315, being an increase of \$18,520,202 in the former and \$24,355,251 in the latter. With respect to exports the increase was chiefly in farm products, indicating both better prices and larger shipments, although other branches of our trade also shared in the stimulation. For the ten months the revenue reached \$24,226,142 as compared with \$21,072,127 last year—and 1899 was the best year in our history. At the same time it is worthy of note that there has been a decline in the relative volume of revenue, due to the operation of the new preferential tariff.

This extraordinary prosperity is not what the Tories bargained for under Liberal rule, and they are very busy these days in trying to show that none of it is due to measures adopted by the present Government. Of course, the Liberals are not so foolish as to claim all the credit for the marvellous expansion that has occurred during the past three years. They know that Providence has smiled upon the land, and that we are getting a share of the good times which have prevailed in many countries. But it must not be forgotten, at the same time, that the growth which has occurred in the exportation of farm products for example, is in some measure attributable to the Government. Mr. Fisher's cold storage measures have been a great help to our farmers, or to those who handle their products—which is the same thing—and the preferences given in our market to England has created a demand in the British market for Canadian goods beyond anything we have heretofore had. There is no denying this. Added to this is the settled feeling in relation to the tariff, which has quickened enterprise all over the country and put our foreign trade on a safe basis. What the Tories said was that everything would go to ruin under a Liberal Government.

This has been a quiet week in Parliament and there are indications that the Opposition are disposed to allow business to proceed, although little real progress in that direction has been made. The Tories are not satisfied with the decision of the Government to refer the alleged irregularities in West Huron and Brockville to a judicial Commission. They wanted a Committee of the House to undertake the investigation, which would have been a complete as well as a costly farce. If anyone stops to think, he will see that a Committee composed of members of Parliament, sitting on the eve of a general election would not be a fit nor satisfactory tribunal for the trial of such cases. Who supposes for a moment that in the present temper of the Opposition any half dozen of their members could sit down with an impartial mind to try alleged election frauds? The question needs but to be asked to suggest the inevitable answer.

The proposition to place the matter in the hands of judges will commend itself to popular judgment. It would have suited the Conservatives very well to have had these cases heard before a Parliamentary Committee, because their main purpose in the premises was to secure matter for the approaching campaign. Their desire for justice may be judged from the fact that throughout the debate they took it for granted the story of the blackguard who has confessed to certain acts of rascality was wholly true, and to hear them talk one would think that Sir Wilfrid Laurier himself had planned the whole scheme of manipulating the ballots. Political considerations were uppermost in their minds. Under such circumstances it will be conceded that the government acted rightly in referring to the cases to Royal Commission having fuller powers than any Committee of the House could exercise. We may now expect to learn the truth.

The foregoing suggests that the student of our political life in Canada must have long ago discovered that the principal stock in trade of the Opposition is suspicion. The last thing they would admit would be that the present government is an organization of capable men, honestly and ardently trying to administer public affairs for the best good of the country. On the contrary, they and their press approach the consideration of every matter with the fixed assumption that there is something crooked about it, some corrupt or unworthy motive behind it, some underhand method concealed in it by which the private interests of Liberals will be served and the country injured. It would be a sheer waste of time to take up the Hansards since 1896 and look for a single sentence spoken by a Conservative commending anything the Government has done. On the other hand these records, as well as the speeches of Conservatives outside the house, and the comments of the Conservative press, breathe universal condemnation.

To the impartial mind this opposition to everything must seem both unreasonable and discreditable. It will be conceded that the Opposition members in Parliament are discharging useful and proper

duty when they criticize, sharply and analytically, the measures brought forward by the Government; but in order to command the approval and respect of thoughtful men that criticism must be fair and well founded. When it degenerates into mere grumbling and unpromising condemnation of everything it becomes a reproach and a farce. Unless the Ministers are both fools and knaves sensible and unprejudiced electors will see that everything they bring forward is not apt to be entirely bad and unworthy. In the operation of the mere law of chances they would surely hit upon something at some time that was good and commendable. It seems to us this view should be recognized by the men who shout scandal and corruption day in and day out.

To meet every measure brought forward by the Government in a spirit of hostility is not complimentary to public judgment. If a government is to retain the confidence of the people it must enact measures and pursue a policy which are in the best interests of the country. Considerations of expediency alone would dictate that course, and governments are not insensible to this. We live in a time when newspapers are generally read, and both sides of questions are looked at by the electorate at large. Our Conservative friends seem to act on the belief that only their side will be considered, which is equivalent to a confession that it pays to conceal and deceive. If this is their view, we cannot think that it is either sound or worthy. The time has gone by when the cry of "Wolf!" will throw everybody into a panic. People nowadays want to see the animal, and the difficulty which the Tories have in producing him. They cannot do this when he does not exist. During the week Sir Charles Tupper celebrated the forty-fifth anniversary of his entry into public life. The occasion was marked by a demonstration on the part of Sir Charles' friends, and the Premier made a felicitous reference to the subject in the House. Although Sir Charles is an uncompromising and sometimes bitter partisan, he is far from being unpopular among the Liberals. If some of the members who sit about him had half as much decency the disgraceful scenes which have occurred in Parliament during the past three years would not have happened. Somehow, no one seems to feel hurt by the baronet's furious assaults; but when Foster talks ugly, as he so often does, it leaves a sting behind.
