

The Christian people who send to heaven the largest number of prayers on the Sabbath for the overthrow of the saloon, put the largest number oftickets into the ballot box on election day in favor of license. Often rum goes on its mission of ruin in advance of the Gospel on its mission of elevation. The altars of Bacchus and Gambrinus precede the altars of the living God. 
