AN EVENING WITH DICKENS.

How the Great Author and His People Can Be Studied by Literary Clubs.

"For an evening with Dickens," advises Fannie Mack Lothrop, writing of "Evenings for Literary Clubs" in The Ladies' Home Journal. "One of the items of the programme might be a sketch of his life condensed into about 200 words. The Dickens drawings by Charles Dana Gibson might be cut from The Journal and hung up before the audience and the story of each character and incident illustrated told. The trial from 'Pickwick' could be arranged for individual reading or for a number to take part in it. A bright paper may be written on 'The People of Dickens' World.' In Dickens' works there are 1,550 separate characters, enough to people a whole village.

"Some of Dickens' poems have been set to music—notably 'The Ivy Green'—and would make a pleasant feature. Anecdotes of Dickens might be given by ten or a dozen members, each giving one. These might be interspersed through the programme. A member with any cleverness in photography might make a series of Dickens' lantern slides from pictures in standard editions of the novelist's works and give a magic lantern entertainment. The death of Paul Dombey would make a pathetic reading from 'Dombey and Son.' Mrs. Jarley's waxworks, as described in 'The Old Curiosity Shop,' could be given with some of the members grouped as characters in the famous show and designated, as Little Nell did, with a pointer."

OTTAWA LETTER.

OTTAWA, 6th July, 1900.—Some steps of progress have been made the past week, but they have been short and few. It has simply been disgraceful the way time has been wasted by the opposition. They have not in any degree abated their disposition to be pugnacious and offensive, and at times it has been very difficult for the speaker to maintain anything approaching decorum. If the session now drawing to a close is not remembered for anything else, it will stand on record as one of the most disagreeable and undignified in the experience of the oldest member in the House. The Conservatives seem to realize this, and of course they try to throw the blame on the Government. There is, however, absolutely no warrant for this.

During the past few days the Opposition have given fresh exhibitions of the tactics which were so freely employed last year. Whenever a Minister arose to explain the items in his estimates, three or four Conservative members have started in to ask all sorts of irrelevant and petty questions, their object being to hit upon something which could not be answered. The moment they did this, no matter how unimportant or trivial the matter might be, they would insist upon all business being suspended until the information was procured. Any one will see how irritating and obstructive such tactics can be made, especially when the questions are asked in an offensive way and with an implication of suspicion.

During the week the prohibition question came up for its annual treatment. A motion was made as usual asking Parliament to declare that the time had come when a prohibitive measure should be adopted and put in force, and to this an amendment was moved to the effect that the vote on the plebiscite clearly showed that the people were not ready for such legislation. The discussion did not last longer than a few hours, and by a substantial majority the amendment was carried. Sincere friends of temperance must deplore these annual scenes, which really do not seem to accomplish any useful results. They rather tend to make the great question of prohibition a plaything in conjunction with the game of politics and to rob it of the serious aspect which it should wear.

The railway subsidies were brought down on Wednesday evening, and were a great surprise to the Conservatives. Members on the Opposition side had worked themselves into a panic over this matter, and for several days they had been seriously asserting that when the list was brought down it would exceed a total of \$20,000,000. This statement was freely made in Conservative journals, and was said to rest upon the authority of members who had actually seen the items as agreed upon by the Government. When they were laid on the table by the Minister of Railways they were found to barely exceed \$3,000,000. It need hardly be explained that the voting of these subsidies does not carry with it any obligations necessarily. The money is merely made available, and if the railway in each instance is built then it will be paid over.

There has been a good deal of speculation among the Conservatives and their journals over possible Cabinet changes, and of course it has been part of their game to insist that a number of the Ministers were seeking congenial berths before the elections. According to Opposition stories the Government is always tottering to its fall. There is probably nothing whatever in any of the guesses which have thus far been announced, although it is barely possible that a slight re-organization may occur later in the year. One of the most absurd statements was that Mr. Blair would succeed Judge King on the Supreme Court Bench, the Judge being very ill and not likely to resume his duties. There is absolutely no foundation for such a rumor, and nothing is more certain at this moment than that the Minister of Railways will lead the Liberal forces in New Brunswick when the fight comes on.

The Tories would very much like to get Mr. Blair out of the way. He has been a source of great trouble to them, and his recent statement of the year's business on the Intercolonial has inflamed their hostility afresh. They cannot get over the fact that the Government railway has been given an entirely new status under the present management, and that the era of large deficits has been succeeded by an era of substantial surpluses. Readers of Conservative journals, however, never get to know much that is true about the Intercolonial. This year the Minister announces a surplus of \$120,000, but the "Mail and Empire," which is the chief organ of the Opposition, keeps on asserting day after day that there was a deficit of \$367,000, and cites this as a reason why the present Government should be disposed.

What Conservative newspapers are saying in relation to the Intercolonial is strictly in keeping with the plan of misrepresentation upon which they have been proceeding for the past year in particular. There has been nothing like it in the history of Canadian journalism. They never under any circumstances allude to the enormous increases in our trade nor to anything else that would indicate that the country is prosperous and

that we have a progressive and enterprising Government. Instead they fill their columns with statements which are always misleading and in many instances positively false. They slander Ministers in the most reckless fashion and put words into their mouths which were never uttered. In short, they present all the indications of a desperate and unscrupulous party, absolutely afraid to let the truth be known. This is a short-sighted policy and cannot fail to do them injury when the actual facts are made known.

One of the main features of this campaign of misrepresentation is the statement persistently made that the present Government has increased taxation. Nothing could be further from the truth. It is true that a larger sum has been collected in taxes; but that has been due to the fact that the people in their prosperity have chosen to import a larger volume of dutiable goods. The Government lowered the rate and added very largely to the free list, which was all they could do. If the Foster tariff were in force the people this year would be paying at least \$6,000,000 more in the way of Customs duties than they are paying under the present tariff. The most direct form of taxation is postage, and it will not be denied that the Government has reduced that by one third.

The emergency rations question was disposed of last night, when the report of the Committee was adopted by the House. The vote was not unanimous, so far as the Liberals were concerned; but those who took exception to the report did not do so on grounds at all helpful to the Conservative view. What the Opposition desired was the condemnation of the Minister, and all their efforts were bent in that direction. There was not a man on the Liberal side who held that the Minister was in the slightest degree culpable in the matter; but there were several who contended that the report should have set forth the fact that the food was not of the best quality, and that the department had been deceived. That the food was good food no one can question; but it was not as rich in nutriment as it might have been. The Minister, however, was entirely dependent upon the report of his chief medical officer, who had the matter in hand, and it would be just as unreasonable to blame him as it would be to blame the President of a bank when one of his clerks managed to defraud the institution. There is absolutely no public feeling in respect of the matter, since no harm resulted to the second contingent through the emergency rations, and if our soldiers had been called upon to use the food they would probably have found it to answer their purposes as well as any other.
