—The Board of Health of Trenton, N. J., has adopted an amendment to the Health Code, placing consumption in the same category as smallpox, diphtheria, yellow fever and other contagious and infectious diseases. It provides fines and imprisonment for physicians who fail to report cases of consumption within 30 days after they so diagnose them.
