HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

FREDERICTON, March 16.—Hon. Mr. Emerson introduced a bill further amending the law relating to election to the general assembly.

Mr. Johnston gave notice of inquiry: "Has the government considered the advisability of appointing an inspector of schools knowing the English and French languages and is it the intention of the government to appoint an inspector of schools, knowing such languages for the districts where the population is wholly, or the majority French?"

Premier Emerson said to-morrow being a day that is particularly honored throughout the Empire, and indeed throughout the world by a large number of citizens of this country, and indeed of all countries, citizens who are in every way honored and esteemed, and in view of the fact that our beloved Queen has signified her desire to have the day particularly honored this year in celebration of and as a mark of appreciation for the valor and sacrifice made by the sons of Erin in the defence of our rights and liberties as an Empire, I think it would be well, having regard to her wishes and I am sure, to the wishes of her people throughout this whole Empire, for us as a province to in some way show our appreciation as well of the valor as of the sacrifices which those, our fellow citizens, of that particular nationality have made on the field of battle and I would therefore move that when this house adjourn it stand adjourned until Monday. (Applause.)

Mr. Hazen—It is with much pleasure that I second the motion made by the honorable premier as a tribute of the respect and appreciation which this house feels, for the loyalty and devotion of the sons of Ireland, who have contributed so much towards the success of the present war in South Africa, and to say that I am in hearty accord with the remarks that have been made by the leader of the government. (Applause.)

Dr. Pugsley—I would like to say a word in support of this motion and it gives me a great deal of pleasure to do so. I would like to make reference to the fact that the first New Brunswicker to lay down his life for our liberty, upon the soil of South Africa, was the son of an Irishman belonging to my own county of Kings. (Applause.)

The house then adjourned until Monday at half past two.

LA LAYANTE DES FRANÇOIS CANADIENS OU ACADIENS.

(Continued from last week.)

Rien de plus faux.
D'abord il est bon d'établir que les Conservateurs pendant les vingt-cinq années qu'il ont été au pouvoir depuis la Confédération, n'ont jamais songé à prendre part aux guerres de l'Empire; que Sir John A. MacDonald, leur chef adoré, et homme d'énergie, de diplomatie sans doute, autant que de politique, dort ou ne peut mettre en question le patriotisme ou la loyauté, a même refusé en 1885 d'intervenir dans les guerres de l'Empire qui ne concernaient pas le Canada. Lui, Sir John, ce chef Conservateur anglais pouvait refuser d'aider à l'Angleterre, mais, Sir Wilfrid, lui, ne peut en faire assez pour convaincre de sa loyauté ces mêmes conservateurs qui ont refusé d'intervenir pendant qu'ils étaient au pouvoir.

Sir Wilfrid n'en a pas fait assez! Voyons.

Que pouvait-il faire de plus que d'envoyer un contingent, puis nu autre, c'est urai, disent les Conservateurs, mais il a attendu trop tard.

Trop tard! Sir Wilfrid dans la sagesse qu'il a puisée à l'étude, considère les horreurs de la guerre, aussi bien que la gloire des victoires sur le champ de bataille. En offrant les services du Canada avant la déclaration de la guerre, son offre eut été considérée comme un engagement à la guerre, que l'Angleterre elle-même cherchait à éviter, et que Mr. Joseph Chamberlain espérait éviter, comme il l'a déclaré en Parlement à ses adversaires qui accusaient le gouvernement de ne pas s'être préparé à temps.

Aussitôt la guerre déclarée, il fut prompt à répondre au Secrétaire-Colonial de compter sur un contingent du Canada, et trois semaines après nos volontaires quittaient Québec accompagnés des souhaits les plus sincères de toute cette population Française-Canadienne. A cela on répond, le Canada devrait maintenir ces contingents à ses frais pendant toute la guerre, et de plus nos soldats ne sont pas assez payés aux taux du gouvernement Anglais.

En réponse à la dernière accusation, disons de suite que nos soldats Canadiens, volontairement enrôlés, dans leur zèle d'aider à l'Empire, ne sont pas allés en Afrique dans la vue de faire de l'argent. A la première accusation, il est maintenant bien connu que l'Angleterre voulait traiter également toutes les colonies Britanniques, et donner paie égale à tous les soldats de l'armée. Puis le gouvernement Libéral n'a-t-il pas ajouté pour nos soldats Canadiens la différence entre le salaire anglais et le salaire Canadien? Les Conservateurs sont mis dans la confusion partout où ils veulent soulever la critique contre le gouvernement, ou contre Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

Mais, allons plus loin, disent les Conservateurs, voyez Mr. Tarte, le Ministre des Travaux Publics, lui, certes, il est déloyal il ne voulait pas contribuer aux guerres de l'Empire.

Etudions un instant l'attitude du Ministre des Travaux Publics.

Lorsque le Président Kruger lança son ultimatum, imposant à l'Angleterre des conditions que l'honneur national ne permettait pas d'accepter, le Parlement Canadien était en vacance. La constitution de l'Amerique Britannique du Nord exige que le Parlement soit consulté sur l'emploi des deniers publics, surtout pour une somme aussi considérable que celle requise pour l'entretien d'un régiment sur un champ de bataille aussi éloigné. La réunion du Parlement est une chose coûteuse.

Mr. Tarte est un homme qui tient à la constitution, aux privilèges du Parlement acquis au peuple Canadien au prix de tout de sacrifices. Cela est de l'intérêt de Anglais Canadiens aussi bien que des Français Canadiens. Mr. Tarte demandait la convocation des Chambres afin de leur soumettre le projet d'envoyer un contingent dans l'Afrique du Sud, et d'ouvrir l'initiative dans la participation des guerres de l'Empire.

C'était la ligne de conduite la plus régulière, la plus sage, la plus propre à amener les meilleurs résultats.

L'opposition criait à l'envoi d'un contingent sans retard, et Sir Wilfrid et ses autres collègues, étaient animés du même désir.

Le Ministre des Travaux Publics consentit enfin à ne pas convoquer les Chambres, et à assumer la responsabilité d'une action inconstitutionnelle, mais justifiable par le besoin pressant du moment, et les déclarations populaires.

Mr. Tarte est un homme fort dans la direction du gouvernement. Si les conservateurs pouvaient tuer Mr. Tarte dans l'estime au peuple, leurs espérances se ranimeraient. Alors on l'accuse de déloyauté. Ou voudrait au moins le perdre dans l'estime de la population Anglaise, et depuis, la presse conservatrice n'a cessé d'injurier le nom de Mr. Tarte.

Pendant que les Libéraux reçoivent les injures des Conservateurs, nos soldats Canadiens de toutes les Provinces de la Puissance, les fils de nos Ministres à Ottawa, du Président du Sénat, n'ont leur sang à celui des soldats Anglais dans l'accomplissement d'actes héroïques sur les champs de bataille de l'Afrique du sud. L'éloquence de leur conduite est plus sublime que nos paroles les plus châtiées.
