DEATH OF MRS. THOMAS HAINS.—The many friends of Mrs. Thomas Hains will regret to learn of her death which occurred at her home here at 1.30 o'clock last Wednesday afternoon. Deceased had been confined to her bed for the past two months, but notwithstanding this her death was unexpected, as Dr. F. J. Bourque, who had been in attendance, informed her family only a few days before that she would probably live for some time. Her death was due to cancer of the stomach, from which she suffered terrible pain. She had a kind and gentle disposition and was beloved by all who knew her. Her loss will be sincerely felt by the whole community and especially by her sorrowing family. She was in the 52nd year of her age, and leaves surviving a husband, two sons, and two daughters, all of which were at her death except Leonard, he being on his way home from Regina, N. W. T., where he had been for some time with the Northwest Mounted Police. THE REVIEW joins in sympathizing with the sorrowing family. The funeral which took place on Saturday, was not very largely attended, this being on account of the wet weather. The services which were held at the house, church and grave were conducted by Rev. ### COUNTY COURT.

The July term of the Kent County Court opened here Tuesday, Judge Wells presiding. The following grand jurors were in attendance:—Jacques Vautour, Joseph Allaire, Hidalphe Barribeau, Moise Barribeau, Anthony McNairn, George N. There were two criminal cases, both against John McLean; one for arson for burning the barn in connection with Philip Woods' residence and the other for stealing two cows impounded therein belonging to McLean. On the first charge the grand jury found no bill, and in the latter case a true bill.

At the trial it was proved on the part of the prosecution that the cattle of the accused were found running at large in the town of Richibucto contrary to a by-law of the Municipality of Kent, that the cattle were impounded in the barn afterwards burned, that McLean was seen driving home the cattle about ten o'clock that night, and that when the barn was discovered to be on fire a short time afterwards the cattle had been taken away. The jury found the accused guilty of the charge and he was sentenced to one month in jail. His Honor, in imposing the sentence, took occasion to remark that the crime was a very serious one and deserved a much heavier punishment, but in this case owing to the circumstances of the accused and the fact that he had a large family dependent on him, he was disposed to be lenient in his sentence. He did not wish this however to be considered as a precedent, for he felt that a very grave crime had been committed. R. A. Irving, Clerk of the Court, and William D. Carter for the Crown; C. There were only two civil cases for trial.

The first case tried was that of Joseph Duplessis vs David Keswick and Moses Allain. This was an action for damages for the conversion of 20 bushels of buck-

wheat of the plaintiff seized and sold by defendants under an execution out of a Justices Court. The jury found a verdict for plaintiff for \$8 00. R. A. Irving and Wm. D. Carter for plaintiff; H. H. James for defendants.

In the case of Wm. D. Carter vs. Thos. Owens, an action on a promissory note, plaintiff's damages were assessed at \$106.50 Wm. D. Carter for plaintiff; R. H. Davis for defendant.

Court then adjourned sine die.

In dismissing the grand jury His Honor referred feelingly to the death of Charles J. Sayre, late Clerk of the Court. He declared that in the death of Mr. Sayre the profession had lost one of its ablest members and the Court a most efficient officer.

### DOMINION DAY.

FITTINGLY CELEBRATED AT RICHIBUCTO ON MONDAY, JULY 2ND.

Dominion Day, which brought with it most delightful weather, was celebrated in Richibucto in a manner which surpassed any previous year. The principal buildings along Queen St. were decorated with flags which gave the town a holiday appearance. People from all parts of the county as well as from Chatham and other places were here to witness the sports. At 10 o'clock in the morning a large number of young men in military uniform and mounted on horses paraded the streets, starting from the court house. In the afternoon a game of baseball was played between the Crescents, of Richibucto, and the Royal Oaks, of Chatham. The game throughout was very exciting notwithstanding the large score and was witnessed by an immense crowd of people. The Crescents outclassed their opponents both in their field work and at the bat, and easily won the game. The score was 30 to 17 in favor of the Crescents, with an inning to spare. The last, but not the least, feature of the programme was the fire works which took place about nine o'clock and were shown from Wark's wharf and which were pronounced by all as excellent. This ended the day's sports which no doubt will not soon be forgotten by those who visited Richibucto on Monday, July 2nd. Good order prevailed throughout the day. The committee wish to thank those who assisted in making the day a success, and also the young ladies who attended the refreshment table.

A dance was held in the Masonic hall at night and was enjoyed by a large number.
