OTTAWA LETTER.

OTTAWA, 29th June, 1900 .- The closing days of the long session witness no softening of the bitterness and acrimony which have marred the sittings of Parliament for months past. There will probably be some who will regard this as an evidence that the Opposition are putting up a great fight, and that they are making themselves felt by those on the other side of the House; but it would be nearer the truth to look upon these things as indications of despair. If the Conservatives had any reasonable ground for hope in the approathing elections they would naturally prefer to go before the people with a record of dignified conduct in Parliament, rather than a record of useless and disgracefful tactics.

for the most part the estimates have been under consideration during the past week, and as the House meets at eleven in the forenoon and continues in session until after midnight substantial progress has been made in this regard. The advance would be much more rapid but for the disposition of the Tories to be captious and obstructive. Although the appropriations asked for are unusually large not a single item has thus far been challenged. This must be taken as a tacit confession on the part of the Opposition that the proposed expenditure is necessary and defensible. Although they may not question by their votes any of these items, it is quite certain, however, that they will go before the country and rail against what they regard as the extravagance of the Government. If they desired to be consistent, they should at least out themselves on record in relation to each appropriation which they regard as ex-

Notwithstanding the large amount of business being done here, Sir Charles Tupper and some of his lieutenants have found time to deliver speeches at two meetings during the past week One was in Pontiac Courty, Quebec, and the other at Hagersville, Ontario. Sir Charles was the principal speaker at each of these gatherings, and his speech on each occasion was practically the same. Whatever may be said with respect to the inconsistency of the Conservative leader, it is only doing him simple justice to say that for the most part he says the same thing every time he gets on a platform. He spoke more than 50 times in the last election campaign and the 50 speeches were absolutely identical. By no manner of means does he ever forget to tell the story of confederation, the introduction of the National Policy and the building of the Canadian Pacific Railway, and nearly all that he has to say on these subjects relates to himself.

At Hagersville Sir Charles ventured upon a prediction of the result of the next elections, and it is almost needless to say that this prediction was entirely favourable to nimself and his party. He did not allow a single seat to the Liberals west of Ontario, Prince Edward Island he claimed wholly, Nova Scotia he declared would return to her old allegiance, and in New Brunswick the Conservatives would make a clean sweep. In Quebec he saw signs of great dissatisfaction with the present Government, and in O-tario he looked for large gains. If his diagnosis of the situation in the other Provinces is no more correct than with respect to New Brunswick, Sir Charles will hardly realize his expectations. It would be much nearer the truth to say that in New Brunswick the Liberals are likely to make a

This sharply defines the issue between parties in the next | the near future. appeal to the country. The Conservatives however, will find it very difficult to sustain their side of the case. It cannot be denied that the present Government have made very substautial reductions in the tariff, not only by lowering the rate of duty on many articles and adding largely to the free list, but by the general operations of the preference given to Great Britain. Notwithstanding this the country has made greater progress in trade and general development during the past four years than in the preceding thirty. Between 1879 and 1896 the increase in our aggregate foreign trade barely exceeded \$65,000,000, whereas the increase since 1896 exceeds \$100,000,000. Applying this astounding fact to the contention of the Conservatives, how can they possibly sustain the proposition that their policy of protection would better serve the in-

With respect to preferential trade Sir Charles Tupper held strongly to the view that Great Britain would very soon adopt a system of mutual protection in trade between herself and her Colonies, and for this reason he declared himself strongly opposed to the policy of the present Government in relation to the preferential tariff. Sir Charles cannot be regarded as a close and accurate observer of events and opinions in Great Britain if he fancies that within his lifetime the Mother Country is likely to depart from the policy of free trade, por will he have the support of the Canadian people at large in insisting that he should withdraw our preference to England unless England agrees to tax her people for all that they may get

terests of the country?

By far the most important feature of the week's work was the annual statement by the Minister of Railways in relations to the operations of the Intercolonial. It will be remembered that last year Mr. Blair announced a surplus of \$62,500, and that this statement was viciously attacked by the Opposition press as a fraud. It was asserted that the surplus had been achieved by the cooking of the accounts and by the charging to capital of items which should have been charged to revenue." The Minister completely disposed of that criticism by a comparison of the accounts in detail, and he also showed beyond doubt that he had actually pent a great deal more out of revenue in keeping up the road than had his predecessor. This year Mr. Blair has announced a surplus of \$120,000, after having spent nearly \$400,000 more on the road than did Mr. Haggart. This would be sufficent to pay the interest charges on the purchase price of the Drummond County and leave \$75,000 to the good.

This splendid result the Minister attributed directly to the extension of the Intercolonial to Montreal. Last year the increase in traffic amounted to \$827,000, and this year to about \$1,400,000. During the ten years preceding 1896 the traffic receipts had practically been stationarv, and the trifling surplus which Mr. Haggart had shown in 1895 had been brought about directly by the reduction of the train services and general neglect in the maintenance of the road. This neglect had entailed upon the incoming Government a larger expenditure than would otherwise have been necessary; but it will now be conceded that the Intercolonial is one of the best equipped and

best conducted railways on the continent. Mr. Blair's statement has been a regular knock-out to the Opposition and a crushing blow to his critics. Quibble as they may, and twist the accounts as they may, the fact remains that the new Minister has brought the Government railway system up to a status in which it is not only a credit to the country but a substantial source of revenue. Mr. Blair's friends in New Brunswick will be highly pleased by his triumph in this regard, and all the more because he has been made such a conspicuous target for the hostility and abuse of the Conservatives.

Mr. Albert J. Dysart is having a large ddition built to his hotel, and can, when this is completed, offer to his patrons good roomy accommodations.


