FIRE AT ROGERSVILLE.—On Saturday, April 21st, a barn owned by Mr. Doctithe Caissie, formerly of Richibucto Village, was destroyed by fire. Mr. Caissie lost all his seed grain, a quantity of hay, wagons and farming implements as well as two large pigs and a cow. A quantity of lumber to build a new house was also burned. The loss is estimated at about one thousand dollars and there was no insurance. Great sympathy is felt for Mr. Caissie as he is an old man and has always been honest and industrious.

EXHIBITION OF GLASS BLOWING.—The exhibition of glass blowing given by the Libby Glass Blowers from the World's Fair on Tuesday evening, was a rare treat to the people of Richibucto. The attendance was not very large, but no doubt will be much larger during the remainder of their stay here, which will be until Saturday night. The performance opened at 7.30 with the blowing of glass so fine that it would float in the air. This was something wonderful as it seems almost impossible to blow it so fine. The next feature was the blowing of a smoking pipe, which the audience declared was really extraordinary. Glass was also blown into wine glasses, decanters, and many other ornaments. A present was given to each and every one present; some of them being valued at as much as \$1.00. The exhibition of spinning of glass was the feature of the evening, and was watched with the keenest interest. A thread of glass so small that it could scarcely be visible with the naked eye was put on a large wheel which was kept spinning for some five or ten minutes. The glass was then taken off the wheel and given to the audience to count the number of threads, which of course was impossible. The exhibition, of which every one speaks highly, will be continued every night this week and should be patronized by every one as the present given away is well worth the price of admission, 10c.

COL. OTTER'S OFFICIAL REPORT.

OTTAWA, May 1.—The following is taken from the report of Col. Otter received at the Militia Department this morning, under date March 10:—"During the march which began the 13th February and ended on the 8th inst., cannot speak too highly of the conduct generally of the officers and men of the Royal Canadian Regiment. Taken altogether the march was very trying on the whole. The men had no change of clothing for many days, were engaged more or less with the enemy, for two-thirds of the time on half rations, were subjected to a very hot sun, cold nights and several severe rain storms. The endurance, courage, good spirit of the battalion were more than tried and it is with pleasure I have to record its having proved itself fully equal to the strain. I regret having to report the sentence to fifty-six days field imprisonment on a Canadian for stealing fowls, the property of an inhabitant. The order on the subject while no doubt the provocation was great considering the lack of food for the previous of looting is most stringent and definite and three weeks yet owing to the constant warming the men had received the offence cannot from a military standpoint be palliated.

In recording the action of the battalion on twenty-seventh ult., I find that a very important event was omitted, viz, the personal inspection by Lord Roberts at his own request. The field marshal in addressing the battalion expressed great satisfaction with their conduct. It was a pleasure in having them under his command and he believed that the surrender of Cronje and his forces had been brought about by their action. The strength of the battalion is very much reduced through the large number of sick and wounded. They are doing well. The battalion is now resting and is on full rations.
