Siberian exile is to be finally abolished | the Customs rate on tobacco coming into the country ten cents per pound. The Tories allege that this is a great burden on the poor man, and it has been most pathetic to hear them bewailing the lot of the struggling artisans of the country who they say, are obliged to pay more for their tobacco. There is, however, another side to the story, and one which completely closes the mouths of the Tories. The olject of increasing the duty on for ign grown tobacco was to encourage home production, and in that respect the new policy has been eminently successful. In 1897 the quantity produced in Canada was 690,000 pounds, and last year the quantity had risen to 2,500,000 pounds; while for six months of the present year the Canadian tobacco passed through the factories totalled 1,900,000 pounds. It will be seen that this is a very large increase, and the benefit accruing therefrom goes almost wholly to small farmers in the Province of Quebec and in Western Ontario. Tobacco is scarcely one of the necessaries of life, and when speaking of poor men the Tones ought to have some regard for these struggling farmers.

What has been said in the preceding paragraph fairly shows the inconsistent Dc course which the Conservatives take in

relation to the tariff. Just now Sir Charles Tupper has committed them to the issue of protection in the coming campaign, the very essence of which is the encouragement of home industry, and yet with such results before them as have been cited in connection with tobacco they are found condemning the only ground upon which protection can possibly be defended. Of course, they ignore this principle in the discussion. Their purpose is to pose as the champions of the rights of poor men, and for the sake of any little advantage they can win in that regard they are willing to stultify themselves.

The defection of Hon. L. J. Tweedie and his public announcement that hereafter he will give his support to Mr. Blair has not been comforting news to the Tories of New Brunswick. The measure of their discomfiture is easily seen from the bitterness of their criticisms rechange. Quite recently these same papers were talking a good deal about the growing strength of the Conservative cause, and boasting rather loudly about the hard struggle which the Minister of Railways had before him. This talk was not sup ported by facts, as might be expected, and this move on the part of Mr. Tweedie is rather a set-back to any hopes they may have been entertaining

The plain truth is, that there is not a constituency in New Brunswick which can be regarded as safe for the Conservatives, while Liberal prospects are exceedingly bright in every county. In this connection it may not be amiss to say that the outlook for the Government in all parts of the county is most encouraging. It is part of the Tory game to bluster a great deal about alleged dissatisfaction time to time. They are unavoidable. The Government cannot possibly satisfy grievances to be known. But the fact remains that most inspiring information comes from all parts of the Dominion as to the growing strength of the Conserva tive cause in the judgment of the great body of the electorate, and this situation is being improved every day by the course which the Opposition are taking.
