—John Walsh, of Washington, and John Nelson, of Philadelphia, have been arrested at Niagara Falls for attempting to blow up Lock 24 on the new Welland canal at Thorold, Ont., late Saturday evening. The explosion badly damaged four gates and destroyed hundreds of dollars' worth of window glass in town. Dynamite was used.—Globe.

—Rev. A. Lucas began his visit to our County Conventions Tuesday at Harcourt. —Last Thursday's electric storm was severely felt at Cocagne, where lightning struck and burned a barn belonging to Stephen Gogan, destroying cattle, horses, sheep and farming utensils. At Notre Dame, Lockhart Brothers' mill dam was damaged and a lot of logs swept down stream by the freshet and ice jam. The freshet caused several washouts on the Intercolonial Railway.—Globe.

The season is now almost over, and one maker informs us, only about 60 pounds have been made so far, while last year he had over 100 pounds made by this date. He does not expect to have more than half the amount that he had last year.

—W. F. King, chief astronomer of the Dominion, who represents Canada in connection with the Alaska boundary, left for Washington Saturday afternoon. He goes to meet O. H. Tillman, United States commissioner, and they will have a conference together to make preliminary arrangements for marking out of a provisional boundary. They will afterwards leave for work in the field. Mr. King will start from Vancouver on June 1st for Pyramid Harbor. Mr. Tillman will leave Seattle about the same time and will meet King at Pyramid Harbor and commence work on Lynn canal. They will be away about two months.—St. John Globe.
