## THE LAKEVILLE FATALITY.

PARTICULARS OF THE AWFUL DEATH OF THE LAWRENCE FAMILY.

FREDERICTON, Feb. 22.—From details which have come to hand to-day of the Lakeville Corner fire, in which Edward Lawrence and his wife and three children perished yesterday morning it is almost impossible to perceive how any of the inmates of the house failed to escape. The house was a two-story one, with ell, also of two stories, attached. The second flat consisted of a hall, running from the front to rear, on one side, and two bedrooms opening therefrom on the other side. A flight of stairs ascended from a point a few feet back from the front door in the lower hall to the rear of the upstairs hall to the room over the kitchen in ell. On Tuesday night there slept in the house Mr. and Mrs. Edward Lawrence, aged respectively forty six and forty-five; their two sons, Woodville and George A., aged respectively eighteen and seventeen; their two daughters, Jane and Theresa, aged respectively thirteen and eleven; Mrs. Lawrence's sister, Miss London, and Oscar Little, a carpenter, who had been doing some work about the premises. Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence and their son, George, were asleep in the front room, the two daughters and Miss London in the back room, and Woodville and Little in the hall. Woodville rose at 5.30, and after putting a fire in the kitchen stove, went out to the barn, some distance from the house, to attend to the horses and cattle. While he was in the barn Miss London was awakened by the smell of smoke. Going into the hall, she opened the door into the ell and found the room over the kitchen filled with smoke and flames beginning to eat through from the kitchen, but, barring the smoke, there was no sign of fire in the main house. Miss London at once aroused Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence and the other inmates of the house, and, leaving her two nieces dressing in her bedroom, proceeded to carry out a sewing machine and other articles of furniture.

Mrs. Lawrence rushed down stairs and out to the back door yard, and after calling to Woodville in the barn that the house was on fire got a pail of water and ran up to her bedroom with it. In the meantime Little seems to have jumped out of an upstairs window and alarmed some neighbors, neither Mr. or Mrs. Lawrence or any of the three children having got out by this time. Little raised a ladder to the window of the front bedroom, climbed up and broke the window. Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence were then in the bedroom and Little called to them to come out. Mr. Lawrence answered: "There's no use trying," and this seems to have ended all attempts to rescue them. By this time the hall was filled with flame and ten minutes later the whole building was a mass of fire. When the building fell the bodies of the five victims came down with it in a heap, indicating that they had all got together in the front room. They were burned to a crisp. The story seems an almost incredible one and is consistent only with the theory that all the inmates completely lost their minds in the excitement occasioned by the discovery of fire.

### MCCREARY NOT KILLED.

LONDON, Feb. 23.—The Evening Telegram's Cable from London says: "Lord Robert's official list of Canadians killed in Sunday's fight at Paardeberg Drift gives eighteen names. Private Patrick McCreary, of the 74th Battalion, Sussex, N. B., was not killed, as formerly reported.

### CRONJE'S POSITION DESPERATE AND HOPELESS.

LONDON, Feb. 23.—Every hour is expected to bring news of Cronje's surrender. On all sides wonder is expressed that the gallant yet ghastly battle at Paardeberg Drift has not yet ended in what is considered to be inevitable. With fifty guns beating upon the devoted band within a terrible shot range of 2000 yards. Surrender or utter annihilation can be the only result unless all the reports of the strength of the Boer reinforcements be wrong. Critics canvass every untoward contingency that can effect Roberts and can see nothing that can save Cronje from the terrible vice in which he has been caught. Only an unexpectedly strong attack on Lord Roberts lines of communication could alter the result. The rumors current this morning that the end of the struggle had actually come but these emanated from information received by the Rothschilds, which subsequently was discovered to be utterly without foundation. General Buller's progress towards Ladysmith is so slow that it scarcely appeals to public interest. General White appears to be still full of fight and to be endeavoring to assist Buller by vigorous bombardment.

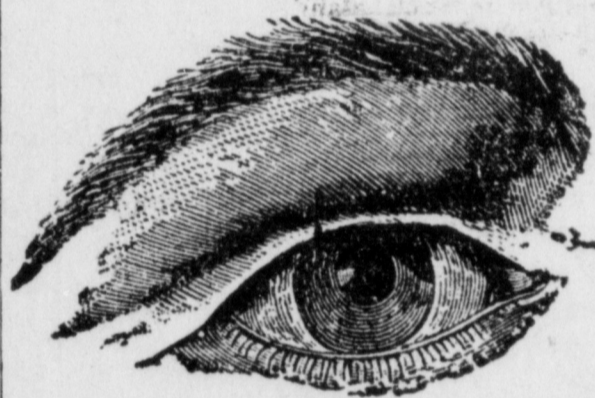
