SAYRE .- Our many friends throughout the county will learn with regret the death of one of our oldest and best known citizens, Charles J. Sayre, Esq, Barrister at law, which oecurred Monday afternoon. Four months ago his left side was stricken and he was confined to his bed since that time. Sunday morning another stroke rendered him unconscious in which state he remained until the end which came at 3 o'clock. Mr. Sayre was one of the leading lights in the legal profession and plead with much success many important suits in the courts of the province. He was born at Dorchester in July 1830, was educated at Sackville Academy, studied law with his uncle the late Thomas Sayre and the late A. L. Palmer, was admitted to the bar in 1884, came to Richibucto in 1888 and has resided here ever since. He married Miss Marshall of this town who with three sons and three daughters survive him, namely, William P., J. Frank and Fred S., Registrar for Kent, Mrs. A. C. Storer of this place, Mrs. W. A. Cowperthwaite, of Easton, Md., and Miss Fannie at home. He also leaves surviving one sister, who for many years has resided with him. He filled many important public positions in the county and represented Kent in the local Legislature from 1878 to 1882 and was a consistent and staunch Liberal in his political view all his life. The sorrowing wife and family have the hearty sympathy of very many friends in this their hour of bereavement. Funeral takes place to-day (Thursday) at 2 p. m. 


FOUL BREATH ... FROM CATARRH


