

IT WILL NOT BE SO GRAND.


CRITICISM OF HER MEJESTY AND OF ENG-LAND HAS HURT THE PABIS EXHIBI-TION.

The Paris exhibition is not to be such a graud affair as the Parisians hoped. The president of the French republic did the opening and he was the only "big bug" there, as is now definitely announced that none of the crowned heads of Europe or the heir apparent to the British crown were present when President Loubet officially declared the exhibition open. The French press, more particularly the Paris portion, has been emptying their demijohns of wrath on the English nation, but now seems to have bottled up the balance of its wrath and is now endeavoring to throw oil on the waters it has so long kept in a stormy state.

Frenchmen, more than any other men, love money, and now that they see that their violent language hurled at the people of this country is likely to have the effect of keeping a vast number of English people away from Paris, some of the Paris journals are trying, by honied words, to assure the English people that the French people have no ill-feeling towards them. Were it not that the Parisians are looking to make much money from the immense crowds of visitors expected, the Parisian newspapers, that have suddenly changed their attitude towards this counwould to-day be still as abusive and sulting to Queen Victoria and her subcts as they were but a week or so ago, The exhibition, if it is a failure, will use financial damage to millions of the orer class of French people, for the tire nation has a share in its success.


