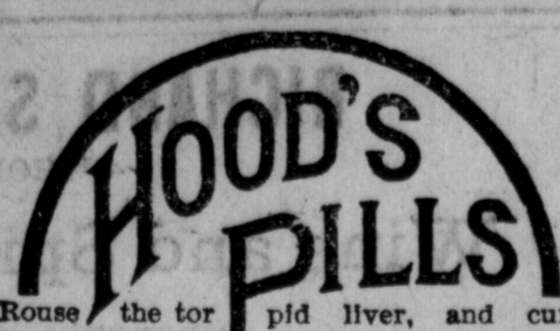
Miss Nettie Smith returns to Boston in a few weeks, also Miss Grace Scott of Jardineville.
