### HANDLING A COLT.

Many people have the idea that if a colt is not handled as a yearling or 2-year old it cannot be properly educated at all. This is true of a few colts, but from experience it is found unwise to attempt to educate a colt, except to the halter, before he is ready for use not younger than 3 or 4 years old. At this age there is not the danger of spraining some joint and blemishing him for life.

### FEEDING ROOT TO COWS.

Turnips, carrots, and potatoes contains a large proportion of water, and though such crops are bulky, yet contain but little of solid matter. Containing so much water they are very succulent, and are equal to ensilage for cattle, though ensilage is cheaper in cost. When cut, sliced or cooked these crops can be fed in connection with ground grain with greater value to the grain by keeping the stock thrifty.

### THE SHEEPYARD.

Not every farmer keeps sheep, but those who do are often tempted in winter to wish the cows were all sheep. They need no milking, no grooming, no cleaning out of stables, but they do need to be well fed in winter with good hay, a little grain and some roots, and they want pure water where they can go to it as they please. The sheep-yard may be as cold as all out of doors if it is only kept dry and supplied with clean bedding, and the sheep will be better for a run out of doors in pleasant weather.

### USE OF COARSE FOODS.

Giving the cow coarse food in order to dispose of such materials will not add to the quantity of milk, but it puts the cow to service converting such materials into manure. A good farmer, however, cannot afford to keep a cow simply to make manure. The manure should be considered only as a by-product. To an animal profitable not only should the coarse and less valuable materials be used, but they should be reinforced by the best feeding stuffs that can be procured, so as not only to increase the yield, but render the manure more valuable.

### FACTS ABOUT CLOVER.

It is not so generally known as it should be that allowing clover to seed is the surest means to destroy all the clover on that field for another year. Alsike clover and the mammoth, or pea vine clover, which bear seed in the first full crop, die as soon as the seed matures. What seed is dropped on the ground does no good for a clover growth next year, as the clover stubble leaves the land too hard for such a tender plant to get a foothold. The clover seed is very small, and when it germinates it has only two tiny leaves and a very small root in proportion. This is best for the young plant for until the root gets firm hold of the soil the fewer leaves there are to evaporate moisture the less likely the young plant is to perish.

### HOME MADE CANDY.

Taffy.—Three cups sugar, cup vinegar, butter size of a walnut, ½ teaspoonful vanilla. Cook till it begins to harden when dropped in cold water. Do not stir. When done pour into shallow buttered pans. This makes quite a large quantity. The recipe can be changed so as to make less.

Chocolate candy—Three cups sugar, cup molasses, cup milk, ½ cup butter, ½ cup grated chocolate, 2 teaspoons flour. Boil the molasses, butter, sugar and flour for 15 minutes. Stir the chocolate into the milk and pour into the boiling syrup. Add 1 teaspoon of vanilla just before it is poured out. Cool in buttered pans.

Brownies—Three cups white sugar, ½ cup water, cook rapidly for 20 minutes, turn out on a buttered platter and stir till cool. Butter the fingers and form into balls. Stick upon a large pin and dip into chocolate which has been set over a steamer till melted. Then lay upon a buttered plate to dry. These are very good.

Hobart candy—Into the whites of two eggs stir as much confectioner's 4 x sugar as will make a soft dough. Mix into this chopped walnuts, almonds or filberts; press out flat on a moulding board and cut in squares. Use any flavoring desired.
