RECEIPTS.

French Fruit Cake.—Cream one-half cup of butter, add gradually one and one-half cups of sugar and one-half cup milk; add two and one-half cups flour mixed and sifted with three level teaspoonfuls baking powder and one-quarter teaspoonful cream tartar. Beat thoroughly, add the whites of six eggs beaten stiff. Flavor with one teaspoonful of vanilla. Bake in layer cake pans and put between the layers a boiled frosting to which is added a mixture of French fruit cut in pieces and figs also cut in pieces. Use candied cherries, dates, figs, or a little shredded almonds may be sprinkled over the top of the cake before baking or the cake may be frosted. The cream-tartar is used to toughen the white of the egg and helps keep the cake light.

For the frosting, boil one cup of sugar and one-third cup of water until the mixture threads. Do not stir after the sugar melts, but if it appears to granulate around the edges of the sauce pan before the threading stage is reached, dip the fingers into cold water then run around the edges to wash down the syrup. If done quickly there is no danger of burning the fingers. Pour the syrup gradually on to the beaten white of one egg, beating all the time. Flavor with one-third teaspoonful of vanilla. A clear day is better for making boiled frosting than a damp rainy day.

Cream one scant of seven-eighths cup of butter and add gradually one and one-half cups flour mixed and sifted with one and one-half level tablespoons yellow ginger. Beat the yolks of five eggs until thick, add gradually one and one-half cups powdered sugar, combine the mixture and then add the whites of five eggs beaten stiff and sift over all one teaspoonful of baking powder. Bake in a deep cake pan one hour. As very little baking powder is added to this cake it must depend on the ingredients being properly beaten.

Madelaines or Cream Puffs.—To one-quarter cup of butter add one-half cup of boiling water. Place on the range and as soon as the boiling point is reached, add one-half cup of flour all at once. Stir vigorously, remove from the range, add yolks of three eggs and one whole egg slowly. Cool the mixture, then shape, using a pastry bag and tube if you have one, otherwise drop from a spoon on to the baking sheet. Bake in a rather quick oven 20 minutes. Cool, then split open, lay in a teaspoonful of strawberry or preserves of any other kind preferred or on hand, then put on a spoonful of whipped cream and press the top on firmly. Now dissolve some confectioners' sugar in hot water and glaze the top.

A variety may be made by filling the puff with a chocolate mixture and serving them with a hot vanilla sauce.

MURDER AND SUICIDE.

NEW YORK, March 9.—A double tragedy, the primary cause of which seems to have been insane jealousy, occurred last night in Brooklyn, when George Orr, a printer, twenty-two years old, was shot and killed by Justo Deayala, a Cuban carpenter. Deayala's wife, on being threatened by her husband on Wednesday, went to the home of her sister, Mrs. Orr. Today she secured a summons for her husband's appearance at court to answer to the charge of threatening her. Deayala received the summons and to-night went to Orr's home to see his wife. While talking with her Orr made his appearance, whereupon Deayala drew a revolver and shot him four times, killing him instantly. He then took another revolver from his pocket and shot himself.

GLOUCESTER, Mass., March 9.—John Lund, a Swede, is under arrest on the charge of shooting his wife, Ida, at her apartments last evening. Although the woman received a serious wound it will not result fatally unless the injury is followed by blood poisoning. Mrs. Lund was seated at the table about 8 o'clock talking with friends, when Lund entered the house. The shooting followed. According to the stories of the visitors at the house, Lund started to call his wife vile names immediately after he entered the house, and fired one shot at her while she was seated at the table. She then ran from the room into another part of the house, being followed by her husband, who fired two shots while in pursuit. After his arrest Lund informed the officers that he did not intend to harm his wife, but fired the shots to frighten her.

A GIGANTIC UNDERTAKING.

Not in the present century has anything of greater importance or magnitude been undertaken than the visitation of every house of a great city in one day. This has recently been done in Philadelphia. The work was planned and superintended by Mr. Hugh Cork and it required two months of his time to make the preliminary arrangements. On the day of visitation, which was Washington's birthday, nearly 10,000 visitors started out, two by two taking a census of the city in the interest of Sunday school work. Every church in the city was interested. The church preferences of the people was determined and those who did not attend any Church regularly were invited to attend the Church of their own choice. The visitation of a million and a quarter of people by voluntary service in one day is an undertaking of gigantic proportions.

Systematic, interdenominational house visitation is one of the agencies of the International Sunday school Convention, to which our own State organization is auxiliary. This is the agency that gives us our Uniform Lesson System and nearly all of the improvements in Sunday school work and management which has come into prominence in the last forty years.

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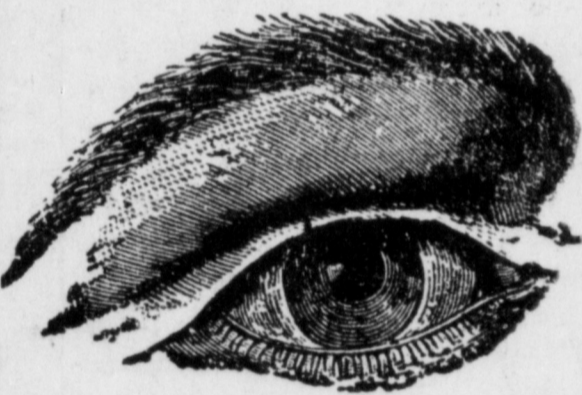
