WHO IS COLONEL FRENCH?

Colonel French, who has shown such remarkable bravery and who has rendered such efficient service in the Transvaal was the organizer of the Northwest Mounted Police in the fall of 1873; at that time he was connected with the Kingston, Ontario, School of Gunnery and recruited in Ontario and Quebec, and organized at Fort Garry. He was the first commissioner of the Northwest Mounted Police, and was in command of the police force on the march from Pembina along the boundary to where Fort McLeod is now located. He left Col. McLeod in charge of the force and returned to Qu'Appelle in 1875, soon after receiving a call to return to England. Col. French comes of a noble Irish family. His brother, Jack French, was also an officer in the Northwest Mounted Police, and was killed at Batoche during the Riel Rebellion, and at the time of the Riel capture.—Canadian-American.

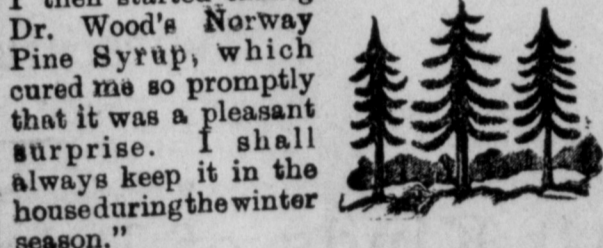

CHIEF JUSTICE'S PORTRAIT.

FREDERICTON, April 10.—Seldom has there been such a large and representative gathering in the Supreme Court room as that which assembled on the opening of the court this morning to witness the unveiling of the portrait of His Honor Chief Justice Tuck, which had recently been procured by the Barristers' Society for presentation to the court. Almost the entire local bar was in attendance, and in addition to these a number of leading citizens of Fredericton and many members of the Legislature, including the Attorney General, Provincial Secretary, Chief Commissioner, the Speaker, Mr. Hazen, Hon. Mr. McKeown and barristers from St. John and other sections of the province were present. The portrait, which is regarded as a very fine one and highly creditable to the artist, Mr. Harris, of Montreal was presented by Mr. Phinney, Q. C., vice-president of the Barristers' Society, who spoke at some length. He referred to the Chief Justice's career as a barrister, clerk of the crown, Recorder of St. John, leader of the bar, a member of the Supreme Court and as Chief Justice, and he pointed out that ability, energy, industry and integrity had always been shown by him.

The Chief Justice made a happy and effective reply. He said it was quite out of his power to respond to the flattering words that had been spoken of him. It had always been his object in life to discharge whatever duties devolved upon him, whether at the bar or on the bench, with fidelity and integrity. His Honor replied at some length to the references made to him as a barrister and in his public capacities, and concluded by thanking from the bottom of his heart all those who had manifested their kindly feelings towards him by securing and presenting his portrait to the court.

THE LONDON TIMES ON LAURIER'S GREAT SPEECH.

"The result of the British system of Imperial rule, as applied to territory inhabited by white races of different origin, were never more strikingly illustrated than by the speech made by Sir Wilfrid Laurier on Tuesday in the Dominion House of Commons. The speech would rank high in any assembly in the world as a model of noble eloquence, but it is not the language or act of the Canadian Premier's address which will make it live in the annals of the Empire. The spirit which glows through it and the thoughts which underlie it are pregnant with great issues for England and mankind. Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the French Roman Catholic Premier of a self-governing federation, in which British Protestants are in the majority, has expressed more faithfully and more truly than any statesman who has spoken yet the temper of the new Imperial patriotism fostered into self-consciousness by the war."—Toronto Onward, April 7.

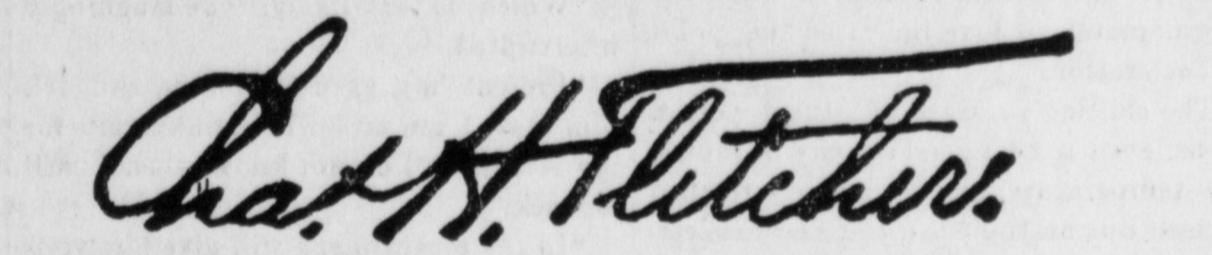
