

In 1861, Mr. Girvan wa placed in the Bank of New Brunswick as attention to something else. an expert accountant, and one year after, his services having proved so valuable to that institution, he was appointed cashier, which position he filled for about thirty years. On his retirement from the hank, he was given a pension as a mark of the appreciation in which his efforts were held. Mr. Girvan was the oldest member of St. Andrew's church, was an elder there for about fifty years, and was justly regarded by all as a pillar of the church. He was also the oldest member of St. Andrew's society. In 1837, Mr. Girvan married a sister of the late Rev. James Hannay of Richibucto, father of Dr. James Hannay, editor of the Telegraph. Mrs. Girvan and one son, Samuel Girvan of the Bank of New Brunswick, survive him.-St. John Sun.

Mr. Geo. Beattie went to St. John last week.


Messis J. & T. Jardine are having a second boiler added to the power of their mill.

We are glad to see Edward Scott return with his two girls after a short visit to McLean Settlement.


One of our East Branch boys were in the lower part of this section Saturday. Messrs. F. and S. Girvan are hauling




