**HOGS NEED EXERCISE.**

Breeding hogs need a little exercise every day to keep them in the very best condition, says The American Cultivator, but how are they to get it in this climate, when the yards and all spots out of doors are covered with snow for three months at a time? If even a wheelbarrow load a day of good fresh horse manure is thrown in a yard for any three that are yarded together, they will spend much time by rooting it over, especially if they find a grain of corn or a few oats it it often enough to keep them interested. We do not want fattening hogs to have anything to induce them to root, nor would we allow the breeding stock to sleep on the manure heap, which is one of the reasons why we do not advise keeping hogs in a barn cellar. Another is that we do not like a manure cellar under the barn. The barn cellar, if there is one, may do to store roots in and to put away carts, plows and other heavy tools if it is dry enough, but then we would like a good cement floor for it. Another reason is that we want the animals to have sunlight when they can, and if the hogs are in a separate building with an open yard they will be out a good deal when the weather is pleasant, even in winter, if it is cold. We want to keep the sow gaining a little every day from the time she is bred until she farrows and yet to guard against her being too fat. This can easily be regulated by the food given, if a little care is taken.

TO KEEP BUTTER FIRM WITHOUT ICE.

A correspondent of Hoard's Dairyman gives the following method of keeping butter firm without the use of ice: "Take a tight box (ten or twelve inches high, twelve to fourteen inches wide, and eighteen to twenty-four inches long), that can be got at any grocery store; put a loose shelf about five inches from the bottom on which to place the butter. Set a dish containing water in the bottom of the box, and place the butter on the shelf. Take a piece of cloth large enough to well cover the butter and drop over the edge of the shelf into the dish of water. Moisten the cloth, spread it over the butter and let the end drop into the dish of water, and it will take the water so as to keep the butter cool and hard and free from salt crystals and in fine shape for table use. Towing crash is the best cloth to use for this purpose. The box should have a cover."

THE CHINESE CRISIS.

SITUATION NOT IMPROVED IN THE LAST 24 HOURS.

LONDON, June 16.—The Chinese situation has not improved in the last 24 hours. Admiral Seymour with 2300 marines is not more than three fifths of the distance between Tien Tsin and Peking and the "Boxers" are destroying the railway in front of the force and burning bridges behind it. Excitement in Shanghai and Tien Tsin is increasing and it is rumored that the relief column itself is in need of rescue. Seymour is a cool intrepid officer of excellent judgment and can be depended upon to conduct the force to Peking if supplies hold out. The foreign admirals may have miscalculated the strength of the "Boxers" and it may be necessary to send a Russian force to support the marines. A Russian reserve of 1700 men is already on shore with guns and horses and this can be increased by 4,000 men from Port Arthur. Englishmen who have confirmed the habit of seeing a deep intrigue in everything Russian, are convinced that the bridges are being burned and marines isolated in order to provide the garrison at Port Arthur with a pretext for sending an army to Peking. In this Chinese affair it is difficult to find out what is on the carpet. Despatches received here before midnight were mainly from the coast towns, and there was little trustworthy intelligence from the capital. Christian refugees have swarmed into Peking mission stations and the embassies and Protestant churches and buildings were barricaded. The China inland mission at Yunnan has been attacked and the insurrectionary movement was spreading from province to province. At Tien Tsin there were rumors of hard fighting but they are not confirmed with authority.
