THE WAR.

ONLY A KAFFIR STORY.

LONDON, Dec. 30.—The reported sortie from Ladysmith resulting in the capture of a Boer position is not confirmed and apparently is only a Kaffir story. A despatch dated December 29 makes no mention of it, and the same message shows renewed activity on the part of the British apparently preparatory to some action. The Boer position eastward of the camp was thoroughly reconnoitered December 18th without drawing the enemy. The naval guns engage in daily practice, and it is said on good authority that thirty or forty Boers have been killed by the firing during the two days. A despatch from Durban predicts that Ladysmith will be relieved on or about January 7. While there is nothing to bear out this forecast, there is some disposition to believe that Gen. Buller is preparing another attempt to advance, this time by an attack on the Boer position on Indwe mountain.

OFF FOR SOUTH AFRICA.

LONDON, Dec. 30.—Mr. Adelbert S. Hay, the new United States consul at Pretoria, left Waterloo Railroad station this morning for Southampton on his way to Capetown. The same train took Lord Edward Stanley, one of the junior lords of the treasury, who has been appointed to a position on General Rober's staff. Sir William Stokes, surgeon in ordinary to the Queen in Ireland, and surgeon to the Meath Hospital, Dublin, and a number of hospital nurses left London for Southampton this morning enroute to Cape Town.

A Complicated Flag.

The Spanish royal standard is most complicated. The red and yellow of the Spanish flag is said to be derived from this occurrence: In 1378 Charles the Bold dipped his fingers in the blood of Geoffrey, count of Barcelona, and drew them down the count's golden shield in token of his appreciation of the latter's bravery. The shield, so marked, became the arms of Barcelona, which became part of Aragon, and its arms were taken by that kingdom.

Now to the royal standard: In the first quarter or upper left hand part of the flag are the arms of Leon and Castile, the lion and the castle; the second quarter is taken up, one-half by the arms of Aragon, one-half by the arms of Sicily. The upper third of the quarter (directly under the first) shows the Austrian colors, the lower two-thirds is divided between the flag of Burgundy and the black lion of Flanders; the upper third of the fourth quarter shows the checkers, another Burgundian device, while the lower two-thirds is shared by the red eagle of Antwerp and the golden lion of Brabant, and on the top of all this are two shields, one showing the Portuguese arms, the other the French fleur-de-lis. Considerable of a flag that!

A native of P. E. Island, now a resident of Marshfield, Oregon, writing under date of December 17th, gives some important information regarding the death of an Islander, Frank Thomas, in Portland, Oregon, which occurred last August. He was employed by the Portland General Electric Co. Death was caused by a live wire. It appears that the company insures each of its employees for \$1,000, and that Frank Thomas was insured. The insurance goes to the company if no heirs are found; if he has relatives on the Island the insurance would no doubt benefit them. The man was heavy set, and had a red complexion. His age is not stated.—Charlottesville Examiner.

The Sponge Animal.

If the sponge as brought up fresh from the sea bottom were a familiar object, says Dr. Ledekker, few would be in doubt as to its being an animal. When fresh, it is a fleshy looking substance covered with a firm skin, and if cut it presents somewhat the appearance of raw meat. Its cavities are filled with a gelatinous substance called "milk." American sponges, and those of all other parts of the world, are inferior to the sponges of the eastern shores of the Mediterranean. The finest of all sponges is the Turkey toilet sponge, which is cup shaped. The American sponge most nearly approaching it in quality is the West Indian glove sponge.—Youth's Companion.

GERMAN STEAMER SEIZED BY THE BRITISH.
