WRECK ON THE I. C. R. NEAR SPRINGHILL.

SPRINGHILL JUNCTION, July 17.—Quite a serious wreck occurred Tuesday morning on the I. C. R. two miles east of here, when No. 16 train, the night freight, which left at 24 o'clock in charge of Conductor John Hughes with Driver J. I. Smith at the throttle, collided with a single engine head on. Although nothing can be learned here as to the cause of the accident, it is understood that the single engine had orders to cross the freight at Springhill Junction and that the freight, owing to some misunderstanding or other, the facts of which are not obtainable, proceeded and the collision occurred. The accident occurred about six o'clock this morning, and as the engines crashed together there was a general spill. Several of the cars on the freight were derailed and the road generally blocked. Driver Smith was quite badly injured.

An auxiliary train was sent out from Moncton and another from Truro and both succeeded in quickly clearing the track.

It is understood that the freight train comprised ten cars of freight including a van, and all the cars were more or less damaged. No one besides Driver Smith sustained any injuries, and his injuries are, it is learned this afternoon, not of a serious character.
