CAPT. ROBERT STEWART DEAD.—A telegram received by George McLeod Sunday announced the arrival at Philadelphia of the bark Bessie Markham from Buenos Ayres. The despatch stated that the vessel was in quarantine, her commander, Captain Stewart, having died four or five days before she reached Philadelphia. Capt. Stewart was ill at Buenos Ayres when the vessel was loading, and it was thought at one time that he would be unable to bring her north. Captain Robert Stewart was well known in St. John, and was held in high esteem by all who knew him. He was a capable shipmaster and a man who was always anxious to help others along no matter at what sacrifice to himself. He was born at Richibucto about 53 years ago and sailed as mate in the ships John Lovitt, W. D. Walleit, Canara, and bark Highlands. He commanded the Bessie Markham for many years, and wherever he went he left behind him hosts of friends who will regret to learn of his death. Capt. Stewart leaves a widow. The deceased gentleman was a member of New Brunswick lodge, F. and A. M., of New Brunswick Royal Arch Chapter, and DeMolay Encampment, Knights Templar.—St. John Sun. [Capt. —Miss Martha Jardine, of Kingston, returned home last week from the Ladies' College, Sackville. Her friends will be pleased to learn that she has won the Mathematical Scholarship for this year, having beaten over 100 girls from Newfoundland, Nova Scotia, P. E. Island and New Brunswick.

—The news that the British had taken possession of Pretoria reached here about noon on Tuesday, and was celebrated by the displaying of flags from the places of business and hotels along Queen St. The people of Kingston celebrated in a like manner and also by giving the school children a half holiday.

—At a meeting of the cabinet at Ottawa Monday forenoon an order-in-council was passed retiring Judge Vanwart, of the Supreme Court of New Brunswick, on a doctor's certificate on half pay. Judge Vanwart, who has been in financial difficulties, has broken down in health and is unable to do any work.

—Every effort is being made by the St. John Exhibition Association to avoid a clash of dates between their show and that at Halifax, and it is hoped that the latter will meet the St. John advances in a friendly spirit. The dates of opening for St. John had been named for the tenth of September, that of Halifax for the twelfth. St. John has offered to either precede or follow Halifax if the latter will open either on the 14th Sept., or the 1st. The public await the Halifax reply with much interest.

—A number of the young men about town held a meeting in the court house last Friday evening to arrange for a big day's celebration on the 1st of July. Committees were appointed to attend to the different sports, and collectors were also appointed to collect funds for carrying on the sports, and we would ask all those (not only in Richibucto but in Kingston as well) who are willing to give to help along the work, to have their donations ready when they are called upon by the collectors. A big day is expected.

—At Norton, Sunday morning, Mrs. Bartlett Graham and her daughter Maggie, on their way to divine service in the Sacred Heart church, were driving across the railway track when they were struck by Conductor Coffey's special. They had plenty of time to get over before the train reached them, but the horse stood stock still immediately after crossing and held the carriage squarely on the track. The engine struck their carriage, smashing it to pieces. Both occupants were carried about 70 feet and thrown headlong clear of the track. Mrs. Graham was killed instantly and her daughter was fatally injured. Her skull was fractured and she expired in a short time. Mrs. Graham was 42 years of age and her daughter 16. They resided near Bloomfield, where Mr. Graham is a farmer. Eight children survive.—St. John Globe.
